JVLY 2017 WILDWOOD HOTEL CONTRACT

The Wildwood Hotel and Purina Farms have met and established a set of policies for ALL "dog groups" who use their hotel. Here are some key elements:

- The cut-off date is strictly enforced. Once this date arrives, any rooms remaining in our block are taken back by the hotel and sold at the prevailing rate.
- ALL reservations now require a deposit of \$125.00 is payable at the time of booking. The funds are applied to your guest-room folio up on check-in. Upon making a reservation, the deposit is immediately non-refundable.

The Wildwood will allow up to 4 dogs per room. There is a one-time per stay pet fee of \$25 for 1 or 2 dogs and \$60 for 3 or 4 dogs.

It appears the Travelodge is unavailable for our dates. There are nearby two hotels many of you have used, Quality and Comfort, at the Pacific, MO, exit. Additional hotels will be listed in the premium list.

NEW ASC FOREIGN LIAISON

Hello, my name is Karin Linde Klerholm, and I am the newly appointed Chair of the ASC Foreign Liaison Committee. My main mission will be to grow the international interest and membership of the ASC, both by individual foreign members as well as foreign Breed Clubs.

The international membership of ASC is currently only 55 members. Canada accounts for 34 of these, meaning that in the entire rest of the world there are 21 members. So far, only one foreign breed club has applied for membership within the ASC, the breed club from Finland.

The ASC needs to get more proactive in involving these actual foreign members and potential future foreign members in the club activities, such as the very important breed specific health research being done by the ASC. A mutual exchange of knowledge across the world would be the ultimate benefit for all!

The newly adopted ASC Strategic Plan, that was presented at the Town Hall meeting at the Summer National on St. Louis, lays out the following action plan that I will be working with:

- Meet & Greet foreign visitors at ASC shows
- Facilitate contacts between foreign visitors and the ASC leadership and other members
- Create a benefits statement and e-brochure targeted at international members
- Contact international breed clubs and reputable breeders to promote the work and benefits of ASC
- Revise the application form for international Specialty Breed Clubs to make it streamlined and attractive
- Consider affiliation with other prestigious international shows and events
- Add non-regular classes at ASC shows, such as "Best Foreign Bred"

This plan should be reviewed and enhanced where necessary to achieve the increase of interest in the ASC globally.

If you have any international breeder/fancier/club contacts that would be interested in joining the ASC, please let me know and I will try to facilitate the process. So far this year, we have received five new individual member applications from abroad, which is very positive. Let's keep this momentum up and double those numbers!

SAFEGUARDING A BREED'S CONFORMATION

The 3 R's – always keep them in mind, they are easy to remember:

- Read
- Reflect
- Respect

Everybody who is seriously involved in a breed has to do homework in order to safeguard the conformation of the breed.

This applies to all breeders, owner exhibitors, professional handlers and judges alike.


READ

How often do you read the standard of your breed?

I, myself, am often surprised when asking this question to breeders that are involved in a breed. They usually reply that they do not read the standard that very often - not even once a year!

The standard is the guide to the betterment of the breed's conformation, with very little space for "free interpretation". I often hear breeders say, - But I think..... Well folks, thinking is not the fact or standard.


When you read the standard you might be surprised to find that the wording is not what you think it is! That is why you need to read the standard more than once in a blue moon, in order to be able to put it into practice.



REFLECT

Every time I read the standard of my own breed I find new wordings in there that I haven't thought of, or "seen" before. I then stop and reflect and maybe even revaluate what is being said in the standard, before the next time I am making a breeding, showing my own dogs or having the privilege to judge other breeder's dogs.

It is impossible to learn a complete standard by heart, word by word, unless you have a photographic memory. That is why it is so important to read and reflect over the standard, over and over again. This gives you the strength to move on in a breed through breeding, showing or judging to a higher standard, not just to what you think is true. If you do not reflect, you will never understand the true essence of the breed.

RESPECT

It is vital to have respect for what other breeders who have come before you, have accomplished in the breed.

You don't know where you are going unless you know where or what your dogs have come from!

Seek out that knowledge by "picking the brains" of the old time breeders/exhibitors/professional handlers and judges. You learn a lot by asking serious questions, and you will get equally serious answers back.

Listen to those that have really accomplished something within the breed generation after generation. Do not listen to everybody else that may throw their advice at you.

There is no need to "reinvent the wheel" all over again, respect the knowledge of the "old-timers" who have worked with the breed for a longer time than you have, i.e. more than 20 years. Maybe you do not understand their viewpoint to begin with, but it will eventually become clearer with time. Keep asking for explanations on why and how a dog moves like it does, how the eye shape may change the expression from good to bad and what that oh, so illusive "true breed type", means.

Sometimes we need to avoid the "sugar coating" when we discuss our own dogs and see it "as it is". No dog is perfect and there is not a single breeder out there who makes all the right decisions. By being critical of your own dogs and choices, with the support of the standard, you will go so much further than many others!



Respect the written standard when you breed, exhibit and judge, don't make your own standard.

THE PERFECT DOG: THE COCKER SPANIEL by Debra Lampert-Rudman, Topaz Cockers

Most of us who own Cocker Spaniels have probably had people ask us what breed we have – whether at a "Meet the Breeds" event, on a walk, therapy visit, or at a dog show – Cockers aren't always easily recognized.

When you smile and respond that you have a Cocker Spaniel, the reactions range from "Oh, yes, my Mother (Grandmother) had one" or "Oh, I didn't know they were that color" or "Oh, I grew up with one but that was a long time ago."


Actually, it wasn't such a long time ago that the general public knew exactly what a Cocker Spaniel looked like – and nearly everyone owned one, knew someone who owned one or wished they owned one – and the purebred dog, in general, was king.

Cocker Spaniels are the 31st most popular breed in the AKC standings right now, but stories of the 15 years, from 1938-1953, when Cocker Spaniels led the American Kennel Club registrations at number one, are legendary.

ANATOMY OF THE DOG by Robert F. Way, F.M.D., M.S.




One would think that Cockers, the smallest members of the Sporting Group and known for being "merry, gentle, and smart" should still be high up on the list of family friendly pet options for the 21st century.


With discussions occurring among Cocker Spaniel Fanciers and ASC membership about potential changes to our current Cocker Spaniel standard, I began wondering what makes the Cocker Spaniel of today so different from its exceptionally popular 1950's brother?


What I found really amazed me.

In fact, in the 1950's, the Cocker Spaniel wasn't just considered a great pet, it was considered a great example of the dog, in general.

In his creation of the "Anatomy of the Dog" educational series for *POPULAR DOGS* magazine, of all the dogs in the world, Robert F. Way, V.M.D., M.S. in 1953 chose the Cocker Spaniel as the "perfect" specimen to illustrate.







In looking at Dr. Way's illustrations of the 1953 Cocker Spaniel, I was impressed not only by how robust, powerful, and beautiful this dog was, but also how natural it appeared. Yes, there was full feathering, and a beautiful flat back coat and trimmed face, neck and tail, but it all seemed minimal and more a neatening-up than a full-on grooming. This dog looks like one an average pet owner could easily manage grooming and caring for and probably enjoy hours of fun and activities together.

In doing further research, I discovered a fabulous thick book with a dusty, dark black hardcover: *VISU-ALIZATIONS OF THE DOG STAN-DARDS*, created by *POPULAR DOGS* (Interestingly, *POPULAR DOGS* was published and founded by George F. Foley, at the time a dog show superintendent for more than 60 years and named "Dog Man of the Half Century" in 1950. He founded POP-ULAR DOGS in 1928 and his company still exists and is now known as MB-F.)

VISUALIZATIONS was considered an important textbook at the time for those truly interested in learning about breeding and showing, and was particularly promoted to newcomers to the world of purebred dogs. In fact, one of the chapters states that the "each written 'standard' describes the ideal of each breed; the specifications are imaginary 'blueprints'... "Standards for purebred dogs should be so clearly written that they leave little doubt as to intent – what is desirScult2—Well developed and rounded with no tendency toward flatness, or pronounced roundness, of the crown (dome). The forlead amouth, the cyclorows and stop clearly defined, the median line distinctly marked and gradually disappearing until lost rather more than halfway up to the crown. of the lower when the jaws are closed. The nose of sufficient size to balance the muzzle and foreface, with well-developed nostrils, and black in color in the blacks and black and tans; in the reds, buffs, livers, and particolors, and in the roats it may be black or brown, the darker coloring being preferable.

NECK AND SHOULDERS—The neck sufficently long to allow the nose to reach the ground easily, muscular and free from pendulous "throatiness." It should rise strongly from the shoulders and arch slightly as it tapers to join the head. The shoulders deep, clean-cut and sloping without protrousion and so set that the upper points of the withers are at an angle which permits a wide spring of rib.

BODT—Its height at the withers should approximate the length from the withers to the set-on of tail. The chest deep, its lowest point to higher than the elbows, its front unlicently wide for adequate heart and lung space, yet not so wide as to interfree with straightforward movement of the forelegs. Rifs deep and well-sympus (throughout. Body short in the couplings and flank, with its depth at the flank somewhat less than at the last rib. Back strong and sloping evenly and slightly downward from the withers to the sector of tail. Hips wide with quarters well-rounded and muscular. The body should appear short, compact and firmly knit together, giving the impression of strength. Legs and feet—forelegs, straight, strongly boned and muscular, and set close to the body well under the scapulae. The elbows well ist down and turning neither in nor out. The pasters short and strong.

with well-turned stifles and powerful, clearly defined thighs. The hocks strong, well let down and parallel when in motion and at rest. Feet compact, not spreading, round and firm, with deep, strong, horny pads and hair between the toes; they should turn neither in nor out. Tail—Set on and carried on a line with the topline of the back and when the dog is at work, its action should be incessant.

COAT—On head, short and fine. On body, flat or slightly wavy (never curly), silky in texture, of medium length, with enough undercoating to give protection. The ears, chest, abdomen, and posterior sides of the legs should be well feathered, but not so excessively as to hide the Cocker Spaniel's true lines and movement or affect his appearance and function as a sporting dog. Excessive coat or feathering shall be penalized. Color and Markings—Blacks should be jet black: shadings of brown or liver in the sheen of the coat shall not disqualify; but shall be penalized. A small amount of white on the chest and throat shall not disqualify, but shall be penalized, however, white in any other location shall disqualify.


Solid Colors Other Than Black should be of a sound shade. Lighter coloring of the feathering, while not favored, shall not disqualify, but shall be penalized; however, white in any other location shall disqualify.

In Parti-Colors, at least two definite colors appearing in clearly defined markings, distinctively distributed over the body, are essential. Primary color which is ninety (90%) per cent or more of the specimen, shall disqualify; secondary color or colors which are limited solely to one location shall disqualify. Roans are classified as Parti-Colors and may be of the accepted roaning patterns of mottled appearance or alternating colors of the hairs throughout the whole coat.

Black and Tan, shown under the Variety of Any Solid Color Other Than Black, should have definite tan markings on a jet black body, with clearly defined lines between the two colors. The tan markings should be distinct and plainly visible, and the shade of the tan markings may be from the lightest cream to the darkest red color. The quantity and location of the tan markings are the essence of this description. The amount of tan markings is restricted to ten (10%) per cent or less of the color of the specimen; tan markings in excess of ten (10%) per cent shall disqualify. A mere semblance of tan markings at the specified locations shall not disquality, but shall be severely penalized; the total absence of tan markings at any of the specified locations, shall disqualify. The marking should be located as follows:

 A clear spot over each eye. (2) On the sides of the muzzle, and on the cheeks.
 On the undersides of the ears. (4) On all feet and legs. (5) Under the tail.

Tan on the muzzle which extends up and over and joins, or tan on the cheeks which is solid, or tan on the feet which does not extend upward towards the knees and hock joints,



able and what is undesirable. Some standards, written many years ago, are still unchanged; they were clear and concise. Most changes made today are to improve clarity, and changes should be made only after much consideration."

The 1968 edition I found featured the 1957 Standard with illustrations of Ch. Pinefair Password for the Black variety, Ch. Benfield's Champagne Snowcap for the ASCOB, and for the Parti – Ch. Scioto Bluff's Sinbad. I was very excited to see these dogs since I had seen their names in pedigrees and heard of them over my 25 years in Cockers.

I've scanned the six pages dedicated to our breed, including the standard and illustrations, here because I found it such captivating reading and thought that

paraphrasing wouldn't do it justice. I also hope it may be of some use for those entrusted with working on potential changes to our Cocker Spaniel Standard.

Notice that there is a Scale of Points, and the highest numbers of points (15 each) go to "Neck and Shoulders" and "Body", followed by "Action" (12 points) and "Muzzle" (10 points) then "Legs" (9 points) Those five areas are very much related to the Cocker Spaniel's function in the field and in the elaborate description of the "Skull" (8 points) descriptions of proportion, angles, and balance leap from the page.

In the 1950's, the Cocker Spaniel would certainly have been working in the field with the hunter, but probably no more commonly in America than it does today. Yet, the functionality and serviceability was paramount and the public was apparently drawn to it.

I think the "General Description" actually expresses the functional traits best: "Embodying the foregoing we have a serviceable-looking dog with a refinedly chiseled head; standing on straight legs and well up at the shoulders; of compact body and wide, muscular quarters. The Cocker Spaniel's sturdy body, powerful quarters, and strong, wellboned legs show him to be a dog capable of considerable speed combined with great endurance. Above all he must be free and merry, sound, well balanced throughout and in action show a keen inclination to work; equable in temperament with no suggestion of timidity."

Quite a few of those words and phrases are still found in our present Standard, however, the "serviceable-looking" phrase, along with "wide, muscular quarters" are no longer included.

The "ears, chest, abdomen, and posterior sides of the legs should be well feathered, but not so excessively as to hide the Cocker Spaniel's true lines and movement or affect his appearance and function as a sporting dog. Excessive coat or feathering shall be penalized." In our present standard, the wording may seem similar, but the implication definitely appears to favor a greater amount of coat:

The ears, chest, abdomen and legs are well feathered, but not so excessively as to hide the Cocker Spaniel's true lines and movement or affect his appearance and function as a moderately coated sporting dog.

Note, the present Standard says "legs" not "posterior sides of the legs" in which the earlier standard allowed for less fur underneath the working/moving dog. Semantics plays heavily in the language of Standards.

I recently spoke with a dog trainer, who specializes in behavioral training, mostly works with pet owners but also shows dogs (not Cockers), ask me what a "keen inclination to work" means. She said that the wording was very confusing to her as a trainer because when she worked with Cocker Spaniel pet owners she said many had read that and thought it meant their dogs were going to be super easy to train; as if they came preprogrammed from the breeder. I told her I thought that was silly – no one could possibly think that way - or could they?

Words – Standards – and their Meanings are open to interpretations by the experiences and interests of the readers. The earlier standard included the words "show a keen inclination to work; equable in temperament with no suggestion of timidity" thereby explaining one of the ways in which a Cocker would show inclination to work – merrily with attention to its owner and no suggestion of timidity. The placement of words can also make quite a bit of difference in meaning without clarification.

I'm wondering if a return to a "serviceable-looking" Cocker Spaniel would increase our breed's popularshall not disqualify, but shall be penalized. Black hairs and penciling on the tan markings shall not be penalized, but tan markings which are "brindled" shall be penalized. A small amount of white on the chest and throat shall not disqualify, but shall be penalized. However, white in any other location shall disqualify.

HEIGHT—The ideal height at the withers for an adult dog should be 15 inches. The ideal height at the withers for an adult bitch should be 14 inches. The maximum height at the withers for a dog shall be 15½ inches and the maximum height at the withers for a bitch shall be 14½ inches. A dog or bitch whose height exceeds the maximum heights specified herein shall be disqualified. Note: Height is determined by a line perpendicular to the ground from the top of the shoulder blades, the dog standing naturally with its forelegs and the lower legs parallel to the line of measurement.



My passion for pet therapy extents further than my own dogs and our pet therapy visits. As an evaluator I have the opportunity to not only evaluate dogs for pet therapy, but I have the pleasure to mentor the teams on their journey to pet therapy after certification. It is always a special treat to help friends and their furkids! Todd and Mary Margaret Miller are Buddy's new mom and dad, and Carl and Mary Napper were Buddy's first. I consider it an honor to call these people my friends. Buddy, Tumbleweed's Look At Me, was bred by Carl and Mary Napper from Texas and is loved and is now owned by Todd and Mary Margaret Miller here in Oklahoma. Mary Margaret is the treasurer of The Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Oklahoma and has been our show chair for three years for the supported entry with The Summer Classic Dog Show in Oklahoma City.

Buddy, with his sweet temperament and bubbling personality, is beginning his new life with Todd and Mary Margaret, and Mary Margaret is beginning her journey as Buddy's handler. This article and the articles to follow will give details as well as highlights along the way to Buddy's goal as Therapy Dog! I will also highlight his therapy dog testing as well as his first therapy visit. THE JOURNEY BEGINS...... (Mary Margaret gives us the inside story of how her journey with Buddy began and is continuing!)



FIRST GLANCE

"As I look back now on the day I first saw Buddy, I remember thinking I could meet our next Cocker today! This thought kept popping into my head as I was getting ready to head downtown to the OKC Summer Classic Dog Show. I laughed and told myself that's just wishful thinking! I must really be missing Trey today. Trey was our 11 year old black and white male Parti Cocker Spaniel that we lost in February 2016. Trey and our other boy, Deuce, were great together, and my husband and I wanted to add another boy to our family when the time was right.

As a member and show chair of the Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Oklahoma, I help out with our club's supported entry and sweepstakes on the Saturday of the OKC show cluster. I always look forward to seeing old friends and meeting new ones. Of course, the best part is all the gorgeous Cockers! As I stood by the ring, my eyes were immediately drawn to a young, black & white male strutting down the walkway. His face was the sweetest thing I'd ever seen and his head was just fantastic! I approached his handler to visit about this sweet boy. She told me that his name was Buddy, and she was his breeder. She also mentioned that she was thinking about finding a home for him after she finished his championship. " Really?!!," I asked. "We would be VERY interested!" She promised that we would talk some more later and headed into the ring with Buddy. I headed over to my friend, Joyce McIntyre, to tell her about Buddy and ask who the nice lady was that I had been talking to. She informed me that it was Mary Napper of Tumbleweed Cockers. Joyce went on to say that Mary is a highly respected breeder and an AKC judge. She told me Mary was also an active member of our parent club, The American Spaniel Club.

After Mary and Buddy were finished showing, she invited me over to her set-up area to meet Buddy and talk some more. We exchanged information and said we'd keep in touch.

Over the next few months, we emailed back and forth. Then one day Mary called me to say that she decided not to try and finish Buddy's championship. She felt that a good home for him was more important than time in the ring. Even though she felt that he could be a champion, she had other dogs at home that needed her attention and would rather place him in a loving home. Buddy had a major win to his credit as well as single points, so he was on his way to his championship, but coming to live with us was going to be a reality. I was so excited – Buddy was going to be OURS!! We set the date for October 9th. Mary and her husband, Carl, would bring Buddy to us at our home in Edmond, Oklahoma."

BVDDY ARRIVES IN HIS NEW HOME

"My husband, Todd, who had only seen pictures of Buddy, fell in love with him immediately (of course!) Everything went so well – Deuce and Buddy got along just fine. Buddy acted happy to be with us. I know Mary was pleased, but she was also sad to be leaving him. Although I think it was hardest on Carl to leave Buddy with us; I could tell Carl thought Buddy was pretty special.

Everything went so well that day; it seemed as if Buddy was destined to be ours. Deuce, our precious 12-year-old boy, was just fine with having a new friend. He's always been so good with other dogs, and I believe he liked Buddy right away. Deuce finds his little "brother" to be a bit annoying occasionally, but he is never mean with him.

I am truly honored that esteemed breeders like Carl and Mary Napper allowed us to adopt Buddy. Mary began showing dogs in 1975 and got her first cocker in 1980. She obtained her first show cocker in 1985 and established Tumbleweed Cockers. She has bred over 50 champions so far! Three of Buddy's littermates are out competing in the show ring right now and will no doubt be finished champions soon.

I told Mary about my dream to train Buddy to become a therapy dog. I have always wanted to train a dog for therapy work, even back in the 1990's when I raised Greater Swiss Mountain Dogs. I lived in Alva, Oklahoma at the time, and it was too far to drive for training and certification.

Now I live in Edmond and have met an amazing trainer and even have a dear friend that is a certified evaluator for therapy dogs! I am excited to begin this journey with Buddy. I think he will be wonderful with people and together he and I can do a lot of good in this world! Buddy has a long and storied pedigree that includes seizure-alert dogs, so I know he's going to be great!"

"Buddy seemed pretty content in our home, even after Mary and Carl left. He ran around as if he was looking for them for a few minutes, but otherwise he settled right in. He was tired enough that night that he made no objection to being in his crate in our bedroom at bed time.

Buddy didn't mind wearing his costume and that fact is so positive as we can use costumes as entertainment with pet therapy. I was so impressed that Buddy took all this in stride and acted like it was a completely normal thing to do. Now that some of the newness has worn off and the steady stream of visitors has stopped, he has become even more relaxed – for a year-old puppy!"

Buddy's Journey To Pet Therapy... (continued) GOALS FOR PET THERAPY TRAINING:

"Todd and I have always taken Deuce with us everywhere we can and will continue to do so with Buddy. The boys have already visited a church pumpkin patch and will soon be attending Buddy's first Cocker Spaniel Club of Central Oklahoma meeting. There are so many petfriendly stores and restaurants here in the OKC Metro area, and we look forward to visiting as many as we can as often as possible. Even our neighborhood is very dog friendly. Lots of residents walk their dogs by our house every day, plus the outdoor patio at our clubhouse restaurant allows dogs. Spaniel Sleuths Glenmurray Kennels

tale of Glenmurray Kennels that follows is about animals, the two-footed and four-footed ones who were and are a part of the events

that have shaped Glenmurray Cockers. This tale begins in 1973 and continues to the present day. Glenmurray Kennels is located on E Elm Street in Ontario California. At the helm is a very unique, special and fearless lady named Lois Wilson. She is also my dear friend.

Nothing is as important as maintaining a strong family. Glenmurray Kennels is such a place where members love and respect each other, continuing to help each other as events evolve and change. The Glenmurray Kennel has certainly left a lasting legacy for our beloved cocker spaniel. Many have contributed to the making of Glenmurray cockers. This "family" remains a part of the very essence of Glenmurray. Over the past 40 plus years, its presence is living proof that Glenmurray remains a place where the greater family comes together, forming long and lasting friendships. In support of my premise - I can readily offer the strong bond of friendship and support which continues between two wonderful ladies - Lois Wilson and Marnie Wood. My nearly 40 year friendship with both of these ladies continues to bring me great joy as well as enriching my life. I owe so much to both of these ladies. I definitely consider Glenmurray to be part of my family.

MY FIRST MEETING WITH LOIS WILSON

To digress, I have known both Lois Wilson and Marnie Wood since the late 1970's. Our mutual friendship began in a very roundabout way. In November of 1978, handler Bob Covey entered the New England Fall Specialty Shows being held in Rhode Island. Bob's lovely string included this big strapping black puppy bitch named Glenmurray's Blueprint, aka "Printer". Upon entering the ring, Printer immediately caught my eye. She was barely 6 months of age and Glenmurray's first real entry of note outside of California. How Printer flew around the ring like a seasoned special. I am happy to report Printer garnered a 5 point major that day at the Cocker Spaniel Club of Rhode Two months later, in January of 1979, Island show. Printer went Black Reserve WB at Spaniel Club, once again from the puppy class. Both Lois Wilson and Marnie

Wood attended that show. We immediately became fast friends ...it is a wonderful friendship which lasts to this day. Thanks in part to serendipity, my silver buff bitch Ch. Glenmurray's Imagination, that I co-owned with Susanne Cummings, was a granddaughter of the very same Ch. Glenmurray's Blueprint.

THE EARLY YEARS OF GLENMURRAY KENNEL

To begin this tale of Glenmurray Kennels, I have asked my friend Marnie Wood to provide a summary of the early years of Glenmurray Cockers. Marnie was an easy choice to ask, since Marnie was actually part of the very beginning of Glenmurray Cockers. Marnie's wonderful summary follows:

"The idea for Glenmurray Cockers came to be in 1973, when I bought a house in Van Nuvs, CA and decided I could now have a dog. There was only one breed I was interested in, since our family pet when I was in high school was a cocker spaniel named Kimberly. However, finding a cocker breeder in the LA area was not easy, and I made many phone calls with no results. Through a colleague in Bakersfield, I found Dorothy Cater of Desert Sands cockers in Phoenix AZ. Dot had a B/T bitch, one year old, for sale to a pet home. My friend Lois Wilson happened to be going to Phoenix for a job interview so I went along to pick up my dog. Her name was Trouble, which I didn't like, so I renamed her Daphne. She was Desert Sands Turbulence (Ch Desert Sands Conquistador x Ch Desert Sands Illusion). Dot Cater became a lifelong friend and mentor to both Lois and me.

So how did Lois come into the dog picture? She was living in Bakersfield at the time, working as Director of Nursing at the Bakersfield Hospital. I needed to go to a conference in Chicago and I asked Lois if she would look after Daphne for me while I was gone. She agreed, so I drove Daphne to Bakersfield to spend the weekend with Lois.

When I returned to pick up Daphne, Lois greeted me with 'I <u>must</u> have a dog just like this one! She saved my life while you were gone. You will have to breed her so I can have a puppy.' 'How did she save your life?' I asked.

The story was: Lois went to bed one night, with Daphne sleeping on the foot of her bed. In the middle of — continued on page 50 —

the night, her door flew open, and a man stood in the doorway, drunk and disheveled. Daphne flew off the bed and grabbed him by the ankle, he took off running and shouting 'I'm sorry! I thought this was my house, they all look alike.'

Lois was determined that Daphne should be bred, so I consulted with Dot Cater and she advised me to go to the upcoming Fresno specialty show and have a look at the dogs and talk to the people. I did that, found dog shows exciting and fascinating, and ended up breeding Daphne at her next season to Ch Tim Bou's Beau Brummell, a black Gayhurst Fanfare son. [We came up with the kennel name "Glenmurray" since Murray was a prominent name in both our families (Lois's father's first name and my mothers' maiden name). The first breeding in 1974 produced 2 boys, but Lois wanted a girl just like Daphne. These 2 boys were the first Glenmurray puppies, and one of them (Glenmurray's Robert the Bruce) was a lovely black & tan boy, the first Glenmurray show dog. The next year Daphne's second litter was born, this time 7 puppies with 2 girls. Lois chose the black bitch we called Glenmurray's Blue Bonnets. Meanwhile she bought a b/t puppy girl from Dot Cater, Desert Sands Saga of Cochise which she planned to show. However, It was "Blue" who turned out to be the foundation bitch for Glenmurray cockers. Lois and I co-owned her and she was bred to Ch Maindale's Smoke Signal to produce "Printer" (Ch Glenmurray's Blueprint). Printer was shown at the ASC Flushing Spaniel show in 1979, and was BOS in the Futurity as well as RWB. By then, of course, we were both hooked on the dog world.

Around 1976, Dot Cater decided to get out of dogs and take up square dancing instead. In downsizing her kennel, she gave us 2 beautiful bitches: One of these, Pitch (Ch Desert Sands Total Eclipse) was bred to Ch Windy Hill's Tis Demi's Demon, and produced Ch Glenmurray's Royal Stewart and Ch Glenmurray's Highland Fling. Highland Fling was bred to Ch Tanorama's Top Card to produce Ch Glenmurray's Highland Caper (Elizabeth, dam of Blackie and High Noon). Elizabeth and Printer were behind the majority of Lois's solid color puppies. She has been solely responsible for the breeding program at Glenmurray Cockers since about 1983."

GLENMVRRAY COCKERS IN THE EARLY 1980's AND 1990's

In the early 1980's, Lois assumed the helm of Glenmurray Cockers. In time, Lois was joined by Dee Dee Wood of Frandee Kennels. Lois concentrated her breeding program largely in the solid color cockers, while Dee concentrated on her beloved Parti-colors. Both had a dream – others might call it a vision. Blurring that vision was the issue they were housed in a very small house with a limited kennel. Fortunately they had a relatively large lot of land. Both house and kennel expanded to better house

their growing family of four-footed cockers. It was needed to accomplish the next steps in their vision.

Glenmurray cockers flourished. Cockers of note carrying the Glenmurray prefix began to make their presence known on a National level. There are far too many to list in this article - but certainly I would be remiss if I did not mention Ch. Glenmurray's Solid Black, ROMX-HT who won the Black Variety at the Denver National in 1993 shown by a very proficient 12 year handler, Ryan Wolfe. The multi Best In Show dog Ch. Glenmurray's High Noon, ROM-HT and finally - to reflect Lois fearless way of "venturing out" the lovely red and white Parti dog Ch Glenmurray's Declaration. Not only did these dogs prove their worth in the show ring ... but also as producers of quality dogs. Many of today's top winning dogs can trace their ancestry back to one or more of these Glenmurray sires - including today's top winning Cocker Spaniel - Ch. Silverhall Strike Force - whose ancestors include BOTH Solid Black and High Noon!

LOIS THE PIONEER

Lois Wilson has never been afraid to try something new. Some might call her fearless at time - me included. I would go so far as to label Lois a true pioneer. I think this pioneering spirit has been evident throughout her life. When I think about the essence of Lois Wilson - my head gives me one vision of Glenmurray Kennel and its well known dogs of note ... but in my heart I feel a deeper essence of who she is. It is a vision of this ever so independent modern day "Annie Oakley" This Annie Oakley part of her nature has often piloted Glenmurray Kennels these many years - totally unafraid to take on a new challenge and welcoming a new avenue. Lois does not simply take on new ventures - she does this while maintaining a generous willingness to share both her knowledge and dogs with others. These qualities have made Lois Wilson the very special person she is. Those of you who know

Lois would certainly agree that Lois always makes the effort to enjoy every moment of her life – much in keeping with what I imagine Annie Oakley was like.

With this attitude and general philosophy, Lois has hurdled many forbidden barriers, opening new avenues that have served to better today's Cocker Spaniel. That is her legacy. Clearly the Glenmurray legacy and influence – on both our two-footed and four footed friends is here to stay.

I think this pioneering spirit is clearly evident in her willingness to export some of her best dogs outside the U.S. Just taking one segment – our Northern European friends – so many names and kennels come to my mind attesting to the influence and generosity of Lois' spirit – Candida, Little Life and Marvellous in Finland, Caci. Cherub and Speedwagon in Sweden, Truly Yours in Denmark and last but certainly not least Doggygarden in Norway. Each of these breeders respect Lois immensely. They appreciate her, knowing full well Lois was willing to send her best to them ... and that she has done.

PERSONS WHO HELPED LOIS ALONG THE WAY

I mentioned earlier in this article many people have contributed in helping Lois create the kennel of note Glenmurray cockers has become.

Of special note, I would be remiss in not mentioning the special contributions made by the following individuals.

- Marnie Wood The first lady to helm Glenmurray and constant friend to Lois Wilson through these many years.
- Dee Dee Wood For sharing her vision with Lois, and her assistance in making it possible to expand Glenmurray Kennel
- Julie Vierosteck A woman Lois holds in great respect as friend, person of knowledge and talent-ed handler.

IN CONCLUSION:

George Bernard Shaw gifted me with this quote that I think sums up best my dear friend Lois Wilson –

"Some people see things as they are and say why" I (Lois Wilson) dream things that never were and say why not?"

For me, a true lasting legacy fulfills a spiritual need that cries out "I have made a difference."... and what a difference Lois has made to our breed.
