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PRESIDENT'S REPORT



I started writing this over the Thanksgiving weekend because I began thinking about the many things I was thankful for, including ASC's numerous dedicated and hardworking volunteers. It is an understatement to say ASC could not survive without devoted volunteers — volunteers who are not looking for recognition and who know

they may be subjected to criticism and complaints, but they volunteer any way. They volunteer with enthusiasm for the sake of volunteering and because they love spaniels. ASC volunteers understand the importance of ASC to the breed and the world of purebred dogs, and they want to work with like-minded volunteers who enjoy and stand for the same things they do. But before I completed this message on that topic, a significant intervening event occurred — the results of the vote on the proposed Breed Standard revisions came out. This event changed the focus of my President's message, not because of the results of the vote, but because of the reaction of some to the results.

In a vote such as this, where members, and even nonmembers, are very passionate about what they truly believe is best for the cocker spaniel breed, discussions get contentious, even combative, hurtful things are said, and when the results are revealed there is great disappointment, sadness and even anger by those whose position did not prevail. I hate to see the hurt and disappointment I know some feel. I truly hate it and wish that there was something I could do to make those members feel better, but each in their own individual way has to work through those feelings. I am not criticizing people for their reactions because I understand the love and dedication they have to our breed. I applaud and thank them for their commitment. But this is when we must come together. We must respect each other's opinions, remember the love we all have for our breed, and understand that the enemy is not someone who may have voted differently on an issue, but outside forces.

The decline in the number of cocker spaniels being bred and shown in conformation is true for purebred dogs across the board. There are a number of reasons for this which includes the simple fact that purebred dogs are under attack. In general, dogs and dog owners today are under intense scrutiny. Urban and suburban governments pass laws that restrict dog ownership because some people are not responsible dog owners. Animal rights activists everywhere have the mantra that "a responsible breeder is

an oxymoron." Additionally, as was discussed at length at ASC's initial strategic planning session, people today, particularly young people, live differently than they did 30 years ago. They are more mobile, often live in multi-family homes (condominiums or apartments), and are drawn to non-purebred rescue dogs as opposed to obtaining a purebred dog from a responsible breeder. Fortunately, I think that the American Kennel Club has finally started fighting back with its power and money to promote purebred dogs, as it should, but it has a long way to go, because purebred dogs were already behind the eight ball when that alarm went off.

After the vote, comments on the ASC Yahoo list correctly pointed out that the National Specialty is nowhere near as large as it was 20 years ago and alluded to the results of this last breed standard vote being the end of cocker spaniels and ASC. But both are strong. Cocker spaniels continue to be at the top of the sporting dog and all-breed standings at all-breed shows. Six cocker spaniels won Best in Shows this year. There are cockers that are top obedience and agility performers and cockers that continue to excel in hunt tests. But what makes the breed strong are ASC's members. Which really brings me back to my original topic for this President's message - ASC's volunteers. ASC is fortunate because it has incredible volunteers that are out there constantly promoting cocker spaniels and the other spaniel breeds, irrespective of their position on the last vote.

ASC membership is no longer in a decline and there are members joining the ASC Board of Directors for the first time. ASC is fiscally stable, without any increase in dues since I became a member almost 30 years ago. As stewards of the Club's money, the ASC Finance Chair and Treasurer prepare annual budgets two years in advance and committee chairs prepare and adhere to budgets. Every year members that include Carolee Douglas and Patricia Petraglia ensure that ASC's Spaniel Hunt Test takes place to maintain the working ability of our spaniels. The last two years, thanks to Vivian Hudson, ASC has held two free standing agility trials. The agility trials continue to grow at the National Specialty and, in 2018, ASC will hold 5 free-standing agility trials. In 2017, for the first time, the English Cocker Club held a concurrent specialty during the Flushing Spaniel Show and in 2018 there will be 3 concurrent specialties - English Cockers, Clumbers and Welsh Springers. Also, obedience and rally have grown at the Flushing Spaniel from one day to two thanks to long-time Obedience and Rally Chair Richard Rohrbacher. Each year ASC has a dedicated group of volunteers who fight the big crowds in New York City and Orlando for the general public to see cocker spaniels at Meet the Breeds in conjunction with Westminster and the AKC Invitational. For the last three

years a fundraising committee for the American Spaniel Club Foundation raised approximately \$170,000 for the cataract study at the University of Pennsylvania and have committed to raise the same amount over the next three years. And these are just a few of the many things ASC members do to support the Club, cocker spaniels and the other spaniels. The point of this message is not to single out anyone for their contributions to the Club, because I could not possibly name all of ASC's volunteers, but it is to show how important ASC is to our breed and what can be accomplished together.

So I am back to being thankful for ASC, its members and all that they do. Irrespective of any differences, we have more in common than not and I hope in 2018 we will pull together and continue to work together.

Including your dog in festive holiday celebrations is all part of the fun of the season; however, your dog might not be feeling the same holiday spirit as you. At the end of the year, things don't look, sound, or even smell like they usually do, and that can cause canine confusion and anxiety. Problem behaviors tend to flare up, and there are many dangers and stressors to be aware of. To make sure your dog enjoys the merriment as much as you do, here are some holiday safety tips.

Be Lware of Holiday Dangers

Decorating the house is a holiday tradition for many families, but the change in scenery can be stressful and even dangerous for dogs. Water in the Christmas tree reservoir and some plants, such as poinsettias, can potentially cause vomiting or diarrhea if they are consumed. Ornaments and tinsel pose a choking hazard, and strings of lights mean exposed wires running through the house, which are dangerous if your dog decides to chew on them. Puppy-proof your house during the holidays, just as you did when you first brought your dog home, keeping an eye out for possible dangers.

Looid Tunny Troubles

Food can be a big part of the holidays and sharing table scraps with your dog might seem harmless. But rich, fatty, or spicy foods might upset your dog's stomach, particularly if he's not used to them. Be sparing with the tidbits or forgo them altogether and instead consider making your dog his very own special homemade doggie treats.

Some common holiday foods can be toxic to dogs. Chocolate is a favorite treat for people, but can cause serious problems for your dog, even in small amounts. And fruitcake, a seasonal delicacy, may contain dried fruits like raisins. Raisins and grapes can cause serious damage to your dog's kidneys, even in small doses. Don't let your dog get into the turkey carcass because cooked bones can easily splinter into dangerous fragments. Keep all food, treats, and edible gifts out of reach of your dog rather than under the tree or on the coffee table. Before the holidays, be sure to brush up on your dog's "Leave It" cue.

Manage the Hustle and Bustle

There is often extra activity and commotion at this time of year with family and friends dropping by to socialize. You might also find your doorbell constantly ringing as a result of packages and additional mail delivery. These extra callers, particularly those who are unfamiliar, can set an anxious dog on edge or overwhelm an easily excited one. Teaching your dog to go to his crate or lie on his bedcan be helpful. It gives your dog a quiet place to relax and escape from the noise and fuss. It's also impossible for him to get into mischief, such as counter-surfing or begging, if he's lying on his bed or relaxing in his crate. Be sure to give him a nice chew toy or stuffed Kong to keep him happy while he stays in his special place. If you're still working on your dog's front door manners, this is a good time to bring out a baby gate to block his access and prevent him from practicing bad behaviors such as jumping on guests.

Beat the Stress

Dogs are creatures of routine, and the holidays bring many changes to their daily life. Along with the added comings and goings, the environment transforms. Furniture might be moved to accommodate a holiday display or the dog's toys and bed pushed aside for more space for guests. Walks and playtime can fall to the wayside as you tackle your holiday todo list. All of this can add up to a dog that is confused and distressed. You might find your dog acting up for attention or becoming more irritable with things he used to take in his stride.

Do your best to minimize your dog's stress and stick to his usual routine as much as possible. Keeping him mentally and physically exercised will help keep him calm and ensure that his needs continue to be met. For serious distress, speak to your veterinarian. Calming supplements or a dog-appeasing pheromone diffuser might also help lower your dog's anxiety. If you can keep your dog safe and stress-free, he will be able to enjoy the holiday season as much as you do.

Notes for the 98th Flushing Spaniel Show

January 12-14, 2018 Knoxville, TN

JANE T. WILLIAMS, SHOW CHAIR

Even with the surprise change of venue, the show will go on at the Jacobs Building at Chilhowee Park in Knoxville. The two-story building will have grooming on both levels. There will be three rings on the lower level along with the superintendent, catalog table, trophy table, photographer, bake sale, vendors, raffles, premium grooming, and concession stand. The upper level will have a judges' hospitality room, grooming, and bathing. Direct access to both levels is available from the parking lots. Exhibitors need to bring heavy duty plastic and shavings for their grooming space. All electrical cords crossing aisles need to be taped to the floor. The facility does have an elevator.

There is no charge for parking and overnight parking for RVs is also available with or without electricity and water. Advance reservations do not need to be made for the show and payment will be made directly with facility staff, not ASC.

The show will have three Concurrent Specialties on Friday; the English Cocker Club of America, the Clumber Spaniel Club of America, and the Welsh Springer Spaniel Club of America will hold their shows prior to the Sweepstakes for the spaniel breeds.

Obedience and Rally classes will be judged by Russell Hornfisher on Saturday and Sunday.

The Holiday Inn World's Fair Park is fully booked; if anyone needs to cancel a reservation, please let Jane Williams know so that the room can be transferred and counted toward the room night total. The new Tennessean Hotel, located adjacent to the Holiday Inn, does have rooms available; they are offering a special rate of \$199 for rooms. Call the 865-522-2800 to make reservations.

Food and beverages will be available at the Jacobs Building concession with expanded hours of service. Please note that outside food and beverages, including alcohol, are not to be brought into the building.



GETTING TO KNOW JULIE WOOD VIROSTECK, DOGGONE COCKERS – A LIFETIME WITH THE BREED

Please tell us about your childhood, growing up in the Frandee family of Cockers.

I got involved with Cockers at birth. My mom, Dee Dee Wood, had shown cockers as a young girl and still had a R/W dog, Wilco's Captain Bly (Tommy) when I was born. She did show him; but when she married dad, my Frank Wood, he was in the Coast Guard and they moved around so she never finished him. Her first cocker was black bitch

named Sampson's Black Delilah that she showed in obedience and Jr. Showmanship.

We lost Tommy when I was about 6 or 7. We saw someone with 2 R/W Cockers while I was selling Girl Scout

Cookies outside of the grocery store. By Christmas, we had another R/W Cocker. She was not show quality; but to me, she was beautiful. Within a month or so, my Mom had made contact with Helen Rice of Corwin Cockers and mom finally had her foundation bitch, CH. Corwin Diamond Lil'. She showed her and put many of her points on her; however Ray McGinnis finished her. They became great friends and he became her mentor.

I believe the first time I ever showed a dog was at the San Gabriel Valley Cocker Spaniel Fanciers Puppy Match. I showed Missy, our R/W pet and my Mom showed Pepper, our B/W show prospect. Mom won and I was devastated! How can a B/W beat my beautiful R/W? Boy, did I have a lot to learn!

A few of my fondest memories as a child were when my Mom won the ASC Futurity at the very first National Specialty in Oklahoma City, OK in 1977 with her great bitch, CH. Frandee's Celebration. What an honor to win the Futurity at the very first National Specialty! Also when she let me, as a kid, show and finish the beautiful B/W bitch that she owned, CH. Frandee's Diamond Lil'. She finished at the ASC Flushing Spaniel show by going WB, BOW and BOS to BV over many bitch specials.

When and how did start out with your own dogs under the Doggone prefix?

When I was younger I had parti-colors that were out of Mom's lines as I felt that she was doing what needed to be done there. So when I was given the opportunity to acquire a beautiful buff bitch that I had shown and finished that was Artru bred, I jumped on it. CH. Roustabout's Hot Flash came to live with me and was bred to CH. Phi-Tau's Trim the Tree. This is the litter that produced CH. Doggone Newsflash. While this was not my first litter, it was my most successful at the time.

I did cross my buff lines into blacks thru CH. Glenmurray's Solid Black and CH. Glenmurray's High Noon. Through that, I had a beautiful black bitch named Doggone Black at Noon. Noonie was shown only once because I had too many client dogs at the time. She was probably one of the best bitches I ever bred. She was sired

by CH. Glenmurray's High Noon and out of a CH Glenmurray's Solid Black/ CH. Roustabout's Hot Flash daughter. She was bred to CH. Westglen Blak Gammon and produced CH. Doggone Justa Minute, NA, NAJ, CGC (bitch), CH. Doggone Minute

Maid (bitch) and CH. Doggone Black to the Future (dog). He was shown and finished here and then sent to Scandinavia. He is behind many wonderful dogs both there and here in the US.

I have also bred many Champions in other breeds over my many years in dogs. Gordon Setters, English Setters, English Springers, English Cockers, English Toy Spaniels, Beagles, German Shorthaired Pointers and others. I have loved being involved in every breed I have bred; but have always loved my Cockers the most.

Tell us about your handling career - when did you start showing dogs for others, as a professional?

I became an AKC Licensed Professional Handler in 1974. I had been assisting my Mom for many years and decided it was time to join the ranks. I really don't know how many dogs I finished while I was handling, but it would have been well over a thousand. It was difficult to show my own dogs when I had client dogs. Mine always had to take the back seat when it came to the ring. Most of mine were shown in the Bred by Exhibitor class because of the conflict and someone else would have to take them back into the ring in the winner's class. Most of the time I would wait to show them until I could get them in the ring between client dogs. Usually it would only take a couple of weeks to get them finished and so it went pretty quickly. Very rarely would I special one of my own because it would be in conflict with the client dogs and when I did someone else would have to take them into the group for me. When I specialed my CH. Doggone Newsflash dog Tracy Carroll handled him in groups way more than I did!

Were you ever involved in other activities with your dogs besides Conformation?

When I was a young girl there was a lot of talk about moving the cocker spaniel out of the Sporting Group into the Non-Sporting Group. There had been no cocker spaniel Field Trials or Hunt Tests in probably 50 years at the time. Well, my Dad was not going to have any of this. He and his friends, Jack Fowler (Hi-Jack Cockers), Dennis Blake (a hunting enthusiast who hunted over his Cocker), and Ralph Meiser (a GSP breeder and field trainer) set out to write the Working Dog/Working Dog Excellent rules for ASC. They were adopted by ASC and the tests were incor-

porated into the national specialty beginning at the National the first time it was held in Cincinnati, OH. Long before that trial I had decided that my specials needed to run in those trials. The CSC of Orange County in California held field training every month. I would make sure my dogs were very clean and somewhat in oil and work them in the field on Saturday; once home, they would be bathed again to be ready to be taken to a show the next day. I ran 2 dogs at the first WD/WDX Trial in Cincinnati, one that was being shown in the specials class at that show and he received his Working Dog Title at that trial. I have also put an Obedience title on one of my dogs and Agility titles on another.

Do you favor in-, line-breeding or outcrosses - Why?

I believe that you have to do both line-breeding and outcrosses when doing what we do. You just have to know when to do each. I've had luck doing both.

In your own mind, what are the most important features of a good stud dog/brood bitch?

"Above all, they must be free and merry, sound, well balanced throughout and in action show a keen inclination to work." This line comes from the first paragraph of the Cocker Spaniel Standard and to me is the most important line in the standard. My dogs must first look like a cocker spaniel. They have to have angles and be balanced to be able to move well. Movement is very important to me! Without proper movement they will not be able to do the job they were bred to do, hunt all day. Even if they never see a bird you have to keep in mind that this is their job and will they be able to run hard all day long. I am a firm believer that not every champion is meant to be bred because it really isn't that hard to finish a dog... especially now when it only takes 6 dogs for a 5 point major in many parts of the country. I don't breed a bitch just to have a litter. If I can't find the right dog for the bitch I just don't breed her.

Would you re-do a combination if you got excellent results in the first litter?

Yes, if I couldn't find anything else that I felt complemented my bitch. I'm not a fan of repeating a breeding but I also wouldn't rule it out.

Picking puppies – what is the best way to do it, for you?

I watch my puppies every day from the time they are born... but really like to watch them when they are on their feet. The best way for me to evaluate a litter is to just put them down on the ground and watch them move around on their own. I like to watch them run around for a while and then I'll pick them up and go over them in the order of how I like them moving. If they can't move right, they aren't built right. With my puppies, the important

time to really watch them is about 6 to 12 weeks and I spend a lot of time each day just watching them on their own.

What fault would be the easiest for you to forgive in a dog and what would you have a hard time forgiving?

First of all I have to have breed type. They have to look like Cockers. Secondly, they have to have reach and drive. While angles are very important to me, I guess I can forgo a little angle as long as they are well balanced between front and rear and not too straight. I cannot forgive a dog that is out of balance.

Do you keep any stud-dogs at home?

Yes, I have had a few. To me, a male has to be exceptional to be considered a stud dog, not just a champion. I'm not one to advertise so never really pushed any of mine to be bred but have had some top producers in the past. My buff dog, CH. Doggone Newsflash produced over 40 champions in very limited breedings and my R/W dog, CH. Derano's Snowman produced quite well too. I have not had any stud dogs for quite a while now but would absolutely keep another if I thought he was an exceptional dog. I do have a young black dog that is finished that I am hanging on to at this time.

Do you work together with other breeders and co-bred litters?

I have co-bred Cockers with a few people but mainly with Lisa Pino (Crazy Q Cockers) and Geri Roy (Carousel Cockers). They were both clients of mine when I was still handling, people I have known most of my life and still very close friends. There was no hesitation for me to work with either of them because I know them both really well and they are like family to me. I can tell you that I would never let a dog ruin the bond that I have with either of them and if it came right down to it and there was a misunderstanding over a dog I would give them the dog and be done with it. My happiness isn't going to be destroyed because of a dog. If you think you want to co-breed with someone you need to know them very well and understand who the dog is going to spend the rest of his/her life with in the beginning. Be fair to the dog and don't pass it back and forth. They can have a litter at someone else's house and it can still be your litter/puppy.

In your own mind, what was the best dog/bitch that you have ever bred, and why?

There are 3 that come to mind when asked this question... a Black, an ASCOB and a Parti-Color. My ASCOB dog, CH. Doggone Newsflash is most definitely the best male I ever bred. He was probably the best balanced dog I've ever had my hands on. The Black would be my CH. Doggone Justa Minute, NA, NAJ, CGC bitch and the Parti-Color would be my CH. Doggone Batter Up bitch. Trying to pick one of them would be impossible.

As far as how many Champions have I bred, I really don't know. I'm not a numbers kind of person. What's important to me is quality. If I had to guess I would say somewhere around 100.

What health-tests do you do on your dogs?

I always do eyes and hips. I have done elbows, stifles, heart, thyroid and Von Willebrand's disease. I also never breed anything before 2 years of age and prefer to wait even longer. I believe that a little older bitch makes a better mother... in my lines anyway as they are a little more settled.

Please tell us about your work and involvement in the ASC Foundation.

I have been on the board of the ASC Foundation for around 15 or so years. I was very excited when the ASCF came to be because there was now an arm to ASC where one could make tax deductible donations which would help with the health and welfare of the breed I love. I have been the President of the Foundation for about 6 years now and, as most of you know, we have been working with Dr. Aguirre and the University of PA on a Cataract Research Study in the Cocker Spaniel for the past 3 years. While we are not where we had hoped to be at this time, a lot of progress has been made and we are about to commit another 3 years. Our outstanding "Eye Support Cockers" fundraising team Co-Chairmen, Laurie Foley and Elena Duggan and the rest of their team have raised about \$168,000.00 to cover the expenses of the last 3 years. The

ASC Foundation is now looking at another \$170,000.00 for the next 3 years. Please remember, we, the members of the American Spaniel Club are all part of the Foundation and when we take this on it is up to each and every one of us to do our part in helping to raise the funds. If any of you have any ideas please let us know!

Did you export any of your dog's abroad and how did they influence the breed overseas?

The first dog I ever sent "overseas" was to Hawaii which was a big deal to me at the time. He was a brown dog that was the best dog I had ever bred at the time. It was a difficult for me to part with him but I knew that he was a really nice dog. I wanted to make sure that any dog that was going that far away with my kennel name on it was a really good one. I did send a few others to other countries including CH. Doggone Black to the Future who is behind many top winning and top producing cockers in Sweden, Finland and Norway as well as here in the USA.

Since you got involved in the breed, have you found that the breed has developed or changed over time – for good or bad?

I believe that I was one of the very lucky ones to have lived through heyday of pure bred dogs and dog shows. Over the years I've seen what I believe to be both good and bad in cockers. I don't like what we have done with their coats over the years. The texture has changed so much in the breed with everyone wanting more and more coat. It used to be more the texture of a Springer with a lot of guard hair and a little under coat. We could let the dogs

we were showing run around the yard in the fall, bring them in and the leaves would just fall out. No more! I do believe that the amount of hair we have on these dogs has affected our pet population as well. I don't think people want a dog with as much coat as we now have. Why buy a dog with all that hair to just cut it off?

We also had a time when the muzzles were getting so short that there was no way they could have done their job. I think they are a little better now. We have gone thru many trends and will in the future again.

What would be your most important advice to a new aspiring breeder of Cockers?

Please go out to a field event and see what this breed was bred to do! I believe every breeder should do this. You don't have to get involved in field work but you have to know what their job is and familiarize yourself with the terrain on which they they work to be able to breed any sporting breed. Then watch the breeders and the handlers and find someone that has what you think you like. See who is winning over a period of months, even years and follow them. Don't get mad because "only the handlers win." They have been around for a long time and they know what is really good about the dog they are showing and what is not. They show off the good points and hide the rest. I cannot tell you how many times while I'm judging I see a dog that I like and I walk up to it on the table, I put the front legs back under the dog where they belong and the person showing the dog moves them right back out under the dog's head. They belong under the dog's shoulders not his nose. At that point I figure if that is the way you want me to see the dog, then that is how I'll judge it.

When did you start judging and what breeds do you judge?

I retired from handling in 1999 because my knees just wouldn't let me continue running and getting up and down. Later that year I was approved to judge Pointers, English Setters, Gordon Setters, Irish Setters, Cocker Spaniels, English Cocker Spaniels, English Springer Spaniels and all breeds of Junior Showmanship. I have never applied to judge any other breeds due to the time it takes and my work managing CJ Feed and Supply in Paola, KS, but probably will in the future.

What is your fondest memory of a judging assignment?

Hands down judging the American Spaniel Club National Specialty in 2006 and putting up the amazing dog, CH. Lydgate Rise N' Shine, all the way to Best of Breed! My two close seconds would be judging the ASCOB variety at the ASC Flushing Spaniel Show and Cocker Spaniels, English Cocker Spaniels and English Springer Spaniels at the Westminster KC show.

What is your fondest memory from within the "dog world" over all?

What has been the most rewarding thing about the dog world to me is the friends and extended family I have met from all over the world. I love that we can go into the ring and compete all day long and still have dinner at night and love each other. Last January my world fell apart when my husband and best friend, Steve, passed away while I was at the ASC Flushing Spaniel show. It was all the people that I was with that took over and got me home where I needed to be. It was my "dog friends" that stepped in and helped me to save my house, and its dog people that are still there every day to give me love and support when I need it. It's even dog people that are the godparents of my children! The people I have bonded with in this sport are amazing and I want to thank each and every one of them for being a part of my life.

Nosework - What The Searches Look Like

I've now laid the groundwork for you as to what nosework is, why it was developed, and places to look to get started. This article will describe the various types of searches and what's included. Please note that these descriptions are general – if I were to describe every search in every organization my article would be pages long, so I'm generalizing a fair amount.

The first kind of search that most dogs do is a container search. Once you get into nosework you will be hoarding boxes and bins of all shapes and sizes. In most organizations, a container search involves anywhere from 8-16 containers, one of which has the target odor in it. The other containers are empty at the novice level, but distractions such as food and toys may be added as the team progresses to higher levels. Also, in most organizations the containers start to vary quite a bit as the level of difficulty increases. I've seen coin purses, plastic pencil cases, backpacks, egg cartons, shoes, garden pinwheels and turkey basters with the tips stuck into the ground used at the Excellent level of competition in the Sporting Detection Dogs Association (SDDA). I've heard of people using envelopes, ballpoint pens (with the ink removed) and luggage as containers as well. Initially, though, people start with boxes or Rubbermaid containers.

The second kind of search that most dogs do is an interior search. The size of the room can vary by organization, but the majority of the organizations make a point of stating that the room should be as natural as possible. The room shouldn't be filled with objects that wouldn't nor-

mally be there - it should present as a regular room. I've seen offices used, as well as bathrooms, locker rooms, storage areas and even stalls inside of a barn. Interior searches can be difficult, because you are faced with a whole room to search, including the walls, baseboards and fixtures. It is important to have a search strategy before your dog starts working, so you can remember where your dog has checked and where it hasn't. In the heat of a trial, it is very easy to overlook a certain portion of a room, and the hide could very well be in that area you've forgotten to search. Most organizations have a height restriction for where the hides can be placed - that restriction can vary quite widely, so most judges will confirm the maximum height of the hides during the walk through. For Cockers, we have an advantage with lower hides, because our dogs tend to have their noses down anyhow. For the SDDA, the maximum height at the Excellent level is four feet, and that's tougher for our dogs. That maximum height is from any stable surface, so that can add complexity as well. I know of one search where the hide was in the handle of a pull down screen in a classroom. There was a chair under the screen, and in order to pinpoint the location of that hide, the dogs had to get on the chair. Even so, that would have been very tough for our smaller dogs. Interior searches often have unintended distractions, such as crumbs on the floor (Jack Jack once spent as much time hoovering the floor as he did searching for the odor), mouse traps,

food on desks (in offices) and more. At the

higher levels, there are typically multiple rooms and one or two might have no odor at all. You have to trust your dog a lot when determining how many hides there are in a room, or if there are no hides at all. It really plays with the handler's head too, and increases the stress levels during those searches.

The third kind of search is an exterior search. In some organizations the exterior search may be only vehicles or the search may include vehicles, and in other organizations exteriors are a separate search from vehicles, and the team has to do both. Exterior searches can be really tough, because nobody can control the weather, moisture levels, wind patterns and small distractions such as critters and insects. I once walked up to the start line of an exterior search (which was three vehicles) and there was a cat sitting on the start line. At that point Jack Jack had never seen a cat and I was concerned that he would blow me off in favor of checking it out, but he paid no attention to it at all. For exterior searches, the hide can be pretty much anywhere - the ground, trees, grass or stuff such as lawn chairs, picnic tables or kids' toys. If the team is searching vehicles, they might be cars, trucks, RVs, boats, tractors or pretty much anything else with wheels. Vehicles can be tough to search, as the wind pulls the odor under the vehicle, where it pools around tires and bumpers. That can trick a novice dog into thinking that's the source of the odor, rather than working the scent cone back to the actual source. When doing exterior searches, it's important to take note of the wind direction, so you can figure out the best way to start the search. You always want to start downwind of the odor if possible, so your dog gets into the scent cone right away and can quickly work to source.

The fourth kind of search is unique to the AKC's new Scent Work program as far as I know, and it is a buried hide. At the novice level there are multiple Rubbermaid bins filled with dirt, and one has the odor hidden in it. As the team progresses through the levels, the hides are placed outside, and several areas have disturbed soil, so that the team can't just identify the hide visually. The hides are buried between 6 and 12 inches below the surface. This type of search has caused a lot of buzz among

nosework people, simply because it's new. It mimics the work of cadaver dogs, and I think it's going to demonstrate to people just how talented their dogs really are.

The fifth kind of search is new among nosework competitors, but not among obedience competitors. It is the handler discrimination search, where the handler brings a cotton item (glove, sock, cotton ball, etc) that they have scented, and that item gets hidden. At the novice level, everything is done with containers. Once the teams progress, the item may be hidden inside, outside or even underground. It's a similar idea to scent articles in obedience (Utility level), but having the item not visible to the handler definitely adds some difficulty.


Nosework isn't about training the dog – every dog knows how to sniff. It's about training the handler to read their dog's body language and see the subtle changes in behavior that occur when the dog is in odor. If you've never seen nosework, the new AKC Scent Work program allows spectactors, so you might gain a lot from finding a trial in your area and going to watch. Watching is one of the best ways to learn body language, as well as to see what we as handlers do to mess up our dogs. This is a sport where the dog really shines, because they're in total control.

Next article I'll discuss the major nosework organizations in Canada and the US, and the similarities and differences between them. Sniff on!

THE ASC FOUNDATION 20 YEARS YOUNG - 1997-2017

Join us in celebrating two decades as the American Spaniel Club (ASC) Foundation! As we enter year four of the Eye Support Cataract research with Dr. Aguirre and University of Pennsylvania we look forward to the continuing support of the Cocker Spaniel fancy. Perhaps a little history is in order on how we got to where we are today.

The relationship of the Foundation with the American Spaniel Club and the Cocker fancy goes back to 1997 when a forward-thinking ASC Board, led by President Louise Milner, formed the Foundation to maximize the ability to raise money for the health, rescue and education challenges facing our parent club (ASC), its members and the fancy. With a 501(c) (3) nonprofit status and a separate Board in place, the Foundation was formed as a cooperative partnership working to promote the primary interests of ASC. The ASC Board recognized that the Foundation, as a 501(c)(3) organization, provided an opportunity for individuals to make tax deductible contributions. It also offers an opportunity for corporations whose charitable giving programs call for education and research efforts to make tax deductible gifts and an opportunity for corporations to match their employees' donations through their matching gift programs. Finally, and most importantly, it enables support of the efforts of ASC to raise funds to support educational programs as well as rescue and research for the welfare and betterment of the flushing spaniels that give us so much love and joy.

While small compared to other canine foundations, over the past 20 years the ASC Foundation has become a trusted partner on health research. From a research perspective, monetary support totaling over \$60,000 has been given to 27 AKC Canine Health Foundation research projects on oncology, epilepsy and autoimmune deficiencies among others. As it is with research, progress is incremental, but by being part of larger funded and fully vetted projects of the AKC CHF we are able to make our dollars work harder than we could going it alone. A listing of these projects can be found on the Foundation website and results of the studies can be found on the AKC CHF website. Our research focus the past three years and for the forward three years is funding the search for a genetic cataract marker in Cocker Spaniels with the University of Pennsylvania and Dr. Aguirre. Unlike other research the Foundation funds, this study is very unique as it is totally focused on our breed. This requires from the Foundation a much larger financial commitment than other research. As a Board we have taken this step cautiously and seriously as every dollar is hard earned. With the help of many we have funded the first three years at a cost of approximately \$170,000 and will require a similar amount for the next three years of the study. By the end of year six, the investment of

over \$350,000 will be our largest single research commitment to date but the potential rewards we hope for our breed are great. Without risk there is no reward. If you have not already, listen in on <u>Dr. Aguirre's webinar</u> – the link on ASC and ASCF websites. It is chock full of information and worth more than one listen.

While the ASC Foundation does not have the seemingly unlimited budget many breed clubs do, we like to think that the attitude of "we can make a difference" rings through each initiative undertaken. In 2015, both the ASCF and ASC contributed a total of \$5000 toward the disaster trailer initiative, AKC Reunite. Our logos appear on an AKC trailer in the northeast and southeast United States. Trailers were brought "into action" during recent weather disasters from Texas to Florida and up the eastern coastline. Those funds were not just a one-and-done donation, but represent an investment in longterm disaster relief. Further, the recent weather disasters brought front and center the need for a Natural Disaster Fund, which the Foundation established just this fall. Funding from donors nationwide are fueling support for current and future needs.

Since 2014, ASCF has spent over \$30,000 in general cocker rescue throughout the United States. From Foundation infancy in 1997 to 2017, our Rescue efforts have grown into a national network of Affiliate organizations bringing some needed monetary relief to local rescue organzations. Rescue is a selfless and expensive passion and our support is rewarded with saved lives and new homes for so many Cockers. Beyond monetary support, our program includes rescue tools, a listing of our approved Affiliates, Code of Ethics required and Rescue Committee information that is enhanced with networking between organizations through online groups. More information on rescue can be found on the Foundation website.

Twenty years in the making, the American Spaniel Club Foundation makes a difference every day thanks to our contributors. Everything the Foundation is able to accomplish is by fund raising donations and legacy estate bequeaths. And, of course, be sure to send the form in to Optigen: 767 Warren Road, Suite 300, Ithaca, New York 14850. If you wonder why the need for the form - check out the Webinar with Dr. Aguirre - the link is on the ASC and ASCF websites. He explains all this in great detail.

Who Is On The Ballots?

KENNETH 'CASEY' COOPER (Futurity, January)

Other highlights as a handler was winning a specialty BOB from the 6-9 puppy dog class at the Mid Michigan Cocker Spaniel Club. Winning ASCOB Winners Bitch & Best of Winners from the 6-9 puppy class in 1997 under Mr. Calvin Ward. I have also won several Sweepstakes, group wins & finishing over 30 dogs (many from the puppy class) during my time in the ring from 1988-1998. I am now living in Palm Springs California enjoying a great life with my husband G. Michael Crosby.

RITA CROWE (Regular Classes, January)

My love for the Cocker Spaniels began in 1972 with the purchase of our first Cocker, the foundation bitch for Fanny Hill Cockers. It was never my intention to just crank out litters and champions. My goal was to establish a bloodline that was sound, healthy and had true Cocker type. In the years before my first Champion was whelped, I spent a lot of time studying pedigrees, learning the standard, going to shows and puppy matches, grooming, and handling. I was very careful to breed my bitches to stud dogs that would improve my bloodline and the breed.

My first Champion was Ch. Fanny Hill's Philosopher in 1978. Among one of many thrills was owner handling "Plato" to WD and Best of Winners for a 5 point major in Louisville, KY under the late Bettie Duding; at a time when the regular classes were as big as the Specials ring at ASC. Another exciting moment was in 1985 when Philosopher's son, Ch. Fanny Hill's Phoenix went BOS to Best in Futurity under the late Ted Young Jr., handled by the late Mike Kinsular. I was especially thrilled as the breeder of both his sire and the dam. Carrying on, Philospher's grandson, Ch. Fanny Hill's Phantom, was born in 1990 and finished with three 5-point majors handled by Kyle Robinson. He was the epitome of breed type and soundness, also producing 10 champions in 7 litters. I have bred, trained and owner handled many beautiful beloved Champions and great producers over my 40 plus years involved in the breed. I am very proud of the Fanny Hill bloodline and, although I am retired from active breeding, Fanny Hill Cockers can be found behind many of the beautiful Champions and top producers of today.

I have been a member of the Ohio Valley CSC for over 40 years holding various offices throughout those years, presently serving as President and Treasurer. I am a life member of ASC, and have served on various committees through the years, including the Standards Committee; currently serving as a judge mentor and on the Archival Project Committee. I obtained my Judge's license in 1996 and have enjoyed my assignments and all

the people I have come to know at shows throughout the county, including the ASC shows, and the exciting experience of judging in Finland in 2014.

I was born, raised and have lived in Cincinnati, Ohio all of my life. I married Steve in 1971. We have a wonderful son and daughter-in-law who have blessed us with 3 beautiful grand-daughters; ages 13, 12 and 10. My husband is an attorney with his own firm and is on the path to retirement. 





Filling Buckets:

FROM THE OLDEST COCKER CLUB IN THE U.S. TO A MOMENT WITH OBO II

robably most of us have our Bucket List. Those things that we hope to do before we leave the planet. Judging the Specialty Show for the Cocker Spaniel Breeders Club of New England was on mine for a long time and this year I was invited to judge their specialty show.

Check! History is a passion of mine along with Cocker Spaniels and the Cocker Spaniel Breeders Club of New England is the oldest Cocker breed club in the country. It was founded in 1922 and this June's show was their 101 specialty show. Show chairs Beth Franzen and Karen Knight pulled out all the stops to make this show an extra special celebration. It was perfect.

The day was warm and sunny and I finished quickly. There were quite a few absences because people and dogs were sick, and people stayed home worried about exposing their dogs to the new dog flu virus. To prevent accidental contamination I asked all handlers to show the bites on their dogs. My Best of Breed was the beautiful, black puppy bitch Silverhall Sensation only 10 months old shown by Bonnie Pike. With her win Sensation retired a three time win Challenge Trophy, a silver punch bowl donated by Dr. Joseph Redden 53 years ago. That was a special moment for me as the ASC Archivist.

Karen Knight is in charge of their club's historical trophies and she had an exhibit at the show. Maintenance of artifacts can be challenging and it was great t to see that this group of old timey artifacts was well cared for and in wonderful shape.

PILGRIMAGE TO VISIT OBO II

The next day Sam and I drove north using our GPS guiding system to find the Rollinsford Grade School at 525 Locust Street in Rollinsford, New Hampshire. There we paid homage to the great Cocker and English Cocker sire, Obo II. Visiting Obo II's grave has been on my Bucket List for the last 18 years

Obo II was whelped in 1882 and is considered the "father" of the breed. His grave is located in the school-yard of the only Grade school in Rollinsford formerly known as Salmon Falls.

We couldn't see the grave from the main street so we drove around the school building searching for the headstone I remembered from pictures. When we couldn't find it we went searching on foot until Sam found it in back of the playground nestled under the trees.

The grave is sheltered under trees and the stone has weathered until his name is barely visible. I gently laid my hand on the

headstone and thought of all the beautiful and talented Cockers who owe their lives to this remarkable sire—Cocker Spaniels and English Cocker Spaniels. We lingered quietly taking it all in and thinking about the dog and his owner, Mr. J. P. Willey. It's obvious Mr. Willey loved Obo and I'm sure he received the best care as he lived to age 13. A ripe old age even today, but more so when you consider those were the days of distemper and other serious illnesses and they didn't have the vaccines and medical care available as we do today.

An ad in an ages old magazine boasted of helpful hints to dog owners. They recommended that the best way to kill a tick was to lay it on a rock and hit it with a hammer.

And the best way to worm a dog is a tiny bit of strychnine on the tip end of your pocket knife. Lord help me!

After a while we looked up to see a young mother with her two children playing on the school yard swings and we stopped to chat. We told her who we were and that we'd come from Ohio to visit Obo II. She told us she'd done a web search on the grave and knew about the dog. She was sorry we weren't able to talk to the school children and tell them more about Obo II Walking away I heard her say "God bless you."

We came back for one last moment and I said my goodbyes to Obo. We placed a bouquet of dark purple *Baptisia* (False Indigo) sent with us by Bob Wall on Obo II's grave.

We also left a purple and gold rosette, a tribute from the CSBC of NE members, a photo copy of Obo ll picture and my ASC Lifetime membership pin on top of his headstone.

As we walked to the car I noticed the street sign noted *Willey Street*, named for Mr. J. P. Willey who once owned all the land around the school and beyond. How nice of the city to honor Mr. Willey this way.

Memories of Morris & Essex

wasn't until many years later that I realized how important this legendary AKC dog show was to the breed with which I have been involved with for so many years – the English Cocker Spaniel. I also had no idea what special efforts went into making Morris & Essex such

a class act. I am so lucky to have been at several of the original shows and, more recently, to two of the revised version held every five years.

In the 1940s-1950s I lived in New York City and was just getting started in my lifelong dog hobby – first by obedience training a very stubborn black (American) Cocker Spaniel in classes conducted by Blanche Saunders in the city and later with my first "show dog", a black bitch from Kay Mauchel's Hickory Hill line. Trips out of the city to dog shows were few and far between.

My father, Ned Douglas, who had lived in northern New Jersey for many years, loved to take amateur movies of sporting events. One of these was the big dog show put on by Mrs. Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge at her estate in Madison, New Jersey. He considered the Morris & Essex show the only "socially- acceptable" dog show around and so we went each year to look at all the dogs even though Dad was really a cat man.

When I got my first "show dog" from Mrs. Mauchel, it was a given that I should enter "Shadow" at the 1950 Morris & Essex show in the Black Puppy Bitch class. There were 17 entered and of course she didn't place. This was a benched show – they all were in those days – but at Morris & Essex you really didn't have to put your dog on its bench if you didn't want to. I put Shadow there anyway, using my "bench chain" and leather collar as I hadn't quite learned about the convenience of crates. I do not remember if I got a free lunch either! And I was such a cocker nut that I never bothered to look at any other breeds at that 1950 show – not even the English Cockers!

The one thing you did once you arrived was to buy a catalog, as they always sold out. I still have one, but confess to having acquired this 1950 edition years later when it meant more to me as a doggy historian! Always perfect-bound, with a deep orange cover stock and dark purple lettering, the pre-world War II ones even came with a tiny pencil on a string so you could mark the results. The listings for each group were divided by heavier stock with a tab, and there were formal photos of every judge placed before their first assignment listings. And not every AKC recognized breed was eligible to enter this big show – Mrs. Dodge specifically invited only the breeds which she felt would draw a decent entry. One of these was the "Spaniel,

Cocker (English-type)" which she firmly insisted as being designated as the "Spaniel, English Cocker.)", even though the dogs were merely a "variety" of the Cocker Spaniel until 1946.

In the 1930s the Spaniels, Cocker (American-type) - (yes, they were identified that way!) classes were divided by color: Blacks, Any other solid color (ASCOB didn't happen until 1943) and Parti-color. There were only two Winners classes: "Any Solid Color" and "Parti-color" with a Best of Winners followed by a "Best" in each. After May 1936 there was a third – the "Spaniel, Cocker (Englishtype)" and these had WD WB, BW and "Best" as well. (The class we now call Best of Variety was termed "Specials Only" and a dog didn't need to be a finished Champion, although most entries were. At the end of the Cocker listings was the phrase: "Best Cocker Spaniel". In the old 1937 catalog the number penciled in was #766 – the number of My Own Brucie, which had won the breed from the classes!

That 1937 Morris & Essex show was the second ECSCA "national" specialty. Sadly the club does not have formal photos of any of the early winners with the exception of Ch. Giralda's Dandylion, the Best of Variety winner in 1939. But there are some remarkable candids which were taken at those pre-war shows including the ring shot of the breed ring in 1939 when Mrs. L. M. Bentley from England drew the huge entry of 80 for the third ECSCA specialty.

Mrs. Dodge was instrumental in the introduction of the English-type Cocker Spaniel to the United State dog fancy. She worked tirelessly to get them recognized as a separate breed with both the AKC and the American Spaniel Club. Her book *The English Cocker Spaniel in America*, long out

of print, is basically a "stud book" listing every cocker with a pedigree of pure British breeding back five generations.

So where were the first ECSCA National specialties held? At Morris & Essex, of course. Mrs. Dodge would have it no other way I am sure. Back then the ECSCA was licensed by AKC, but was not yet a member club. We were a member club of the American Spaniel Club which oversaw all the flushing spaniel breeds. There were no such things as today's "designated specialties" and the English Cocker Spaniel was still technically a variety of the Cocker Spaniel. But the ECSCA had an impressive list of trophies on offer and the club members considered Morris & Essex the "National" - at least historically speaking. The breed drew large entries from 1937 to 1941, those years being considered the first five "nationals". Large entries continued after the war until Mrs. Dodge discontinued the big show after the 1957 event.

A win at Morris & Essex was and continues to be, a most important accomplishment for owners of English Cocker Spaniels. Weren't we lucky to have that great patroness of our breed also be the grand dame of the legendary Morris & Essex dog show?



I'm beginning a new series of articles on Cocker Spaniels that are finished champions and have gone on to certify as therapy dogs. This series is titled "CHAMPION TO PET THERAPY". Some have also trained and/or titled in performance events such as agility, rally, obedience, barn hunt, trick dog, dock diving, or any sport that keeps them active and happy.

In the first series of articles, I am featuring two handsome black cocker boys, Ace, MBIS MBISS A/C GCH Mario N Beechwood's Midnight Express CGC CGN TDI and Thomas, CH Marshen's Showin' Me The Way BN RAE OA AXJ XF CGC PAWS of CNY. Both of these boys have stories to tell after retiring or slowing down from the show ring. They are enjoying the thrill of activities and putting smiles on faces of the people they visit. Their stories are told by their humans!

Ace, MBIS MBISS A/C GCH Mario N Beechwood's Midnight Express CGC CGN TDI was bred by Mark Ragusa and Pam Ragusa. From the time he was six weeks old, Mark would beg me to come and take a look at this "little black puppy". Finally, but reluctantly (because Mark and I had our first litter on the ground under our now Mar-K prefix, and we were excited about a b/t boy in that litter), I went! He was a nice puppy for sure, and so the story began. I remember in one of his first shows at six months old, Mark and I drove to Edmonton Alberta for the Canadian National. In the sweepstakes on Friday night, Mark's shoes were squeaking on the mats, and Ace refused to walk on them. What a great start!! From there history was in the making. He won his first BIS at just 15 months old, and what an honor that was as it was the judge's first BIS assignment. Knowing that the ribbon would go to the owners, I wanted to make sure Pam also had a ribbon, so I ordered her one right away. I never expected what was in store for Ace and his future.

In his first year of campaigning (2011), he won 20 BIS. This was in limited showing so he wouldn't be pushed at such a young age. He ended that year #7 All Breeds in Canada. The following year was definitely a year that Mark and I will never forget. After a few shows at the beginning of the 2012 show season, we ventured off to Westminster Kennel Club never imagining what was in store. We were awarded Best of Variety and were shocked to say the least. The black variety that year was full of a line-up of some of the very best dogs in our breed. After our official win photo, we walked out of the ring and were bombarded with media and microphones. The next two

days I spent countless hours on the phone doing interviews all over the US and Canada. Ace and I took off to shows in Canada that next week-end and were followed at the show by one of the largest TV stations in Ontario. What great press for our breed, purebred dogs, and dog shows.

Ace took every moment, camera, and person petting him in stride. As we continued in Canada in 2012, it became obvious that we could accomplish something that we had never considered... Top Dog All Breeds—and after 57 BIS, Ace became the first American Cocker Spaniel to become Canada's Top Dog. Some of our memorable wins are our record breaking BIS for a Cocker Spaniel in Canada (the 29th BIS) winning his first BISS at 11 months old. To date Ace has won the Canadian National three times (this year he won it from the veteran class), US National, winning our first US BIS and representing Canada at the Eukanuba World Challenge in Orlando. It would seem unfair to pick only some moments in his career that meant more than others because his entire career is made up of so many memorable wins and unforgettable moments. We have had support and shared these moments with friends, family, and the fancy around the world. Throughout his entire career, I knew Ace was special and more than just a "show dog." Still to this day, he travels to every show with me and hangs out on his table waiting for people to pet him. He tries to steal treats from the pockets of those handlers that may stand too close to him!

When did I decide that being a therapy dog was something I wanted us to do??... It was after the school shooting in Sandy Hook in December of 2012 (just one town over from where Mark and I live), I saw therapy dogs and their handlers on TV going to the town to help comfort the peo-

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ple of Sandy Hook. I knew that this was the perfect thing for Ace to do. I contacted someone back then but I received no response. I did not know at that time that there was actually a process and organizations dedicated to pet therapy and registries that certified them.

I had talked with Debi Rudman, therapy dog handler and TDI evaluator, on many occasions the last couple of years about doing therapy work with Ace, but I never seriously pursued it until this year. Knowing that Ace's show career was winding down, I felt he still had so much to give back. In August we went to a Therapy Dog International test hosted by Southern New Jersey CSC and evaluator Debi Rudman. Ace and I passed the test with flying colors, and Ace is an official therapy dog registered with Therapy Dog International.

By the time this article comes out, we will be doing some of our first visits as a TDI team. I also plan to get him involved with Tail Waggin' Tutors, which is also a TDI program where children read to dogs. I am excited for Ace to begin the next chapter in his life. I know he will use his

Twenty-four years ago I was looking for my first dog. A friend recommended a Cocker Spaniel and introduced me to Betty Durland (Dur-bet) and David Kittredge (Kittcar). I got a young finished champion from David and fell totally in love with the "Do It All" cockers. Fast forward to 2010, and the cutest little black puppy came home with me from his breeder, Marsha James (Marshens). I knew that I was in love with this baby boy from the first time I met him and am forever grateful that he is mine!

"Little Black Boy" became Marshen's Showin' Me The Way " or Tom Tom, Thomas, Tommy or Tom. His sire is AM LUX CH Marshen's Ain't Seen Noth'in Yet (Leroy), and his dam is CH Hackie Amazing Grace (Maizie). Tommy was introduced to his new life by his 4-legged brothers, Edward and Joseph, and his great Boston Terrier friend, Denver. They made sure he knew how to get along with others and how to be a good family citizen. One of Tom's first adventures was to an agility trial. He had only been home a week so this was his first major outing. He was the best puppy and probably the most popular dog at the trial. I'd come back to our crating section and someone would be holding him or taking him out of the crate. I kept hearing, "He needs to be socialized", and HE WAS! While appreciating conformation, my love is training and participating in performance events. That first little cocker from 24 years ago was taken to an obedience class, and I got hooked on training. All of the dogs since then have had training in both obedience and agility along with earning their Canine Good Citizen certificates. Each dog has achieved a little more than his predecessor, and Thomas has achieved more than any dog I have had. Tommy is the complete package. I had friends who were active with PAWS of CNY and decided to see if Thomas had the potential to flourish in yet another activity. We took and passed the initial evaluation in May. We then had to complete two supervised visits at a nursing home type facility. At our first visit, Tommy

was a little unsure about what we were doing, but he soon became very comfortable when he was offered Cheerios by the residents! His tail was wagging as we went in the building for our second visit, and we became certified in October of this year.

We will continue to do regular monthly visits at that facility; however, my therapy dog goal is to take Thomas into the elementary schools. We will be going several times during the school year to "read" with first graders. PAWS teams also make regular visits to college campuses. There is one in our city, and we will be visiting dorms and the college library for de-stress events before exams. I am really looking forward to these new adventures, and I know Tommy is going to enjoy them as well.

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Ballot Count

All of the ballots regarding the proposed changes to the Cocker Spaniel Breed Standard have been counted. The only proposed change that passed was to add the disqualification for blue eyes or blue specks in the eye.

As previously reported 1032 envelopes were sent out to 985 individual and 47 member clubs. 709 envelopes were returned by Novembter 1, 2017. Ten ballots were received after November 1, 2017. The envelopes were sent to Jimmy Stucky, CPA, in Auburn, Alabama to tabulate the totals of each of the 4 ballots. He actually determined that there were 710 envelopes. As to each of the 4 ballots there were two (2) invalid votes because there were 2 ballots in one envelope. The By-Laws state that "each voter, after marking his ballot, shall seal it in the blank envelope sent out with the ballot and which in turn shall be placed in the second envelope addressed to the Secretary, marked "Ballot" and bearing the name of the member to whom it was sent."

This has been a thoughtful, vigorously debated, and sometimes contentious process, but the membership has spoken. For the good of ASC and the love of our breed, I hope, and I think we will, **all move forward together.**
