A good time was had by all at this year's annual Welcome Party, the Top Dog Dinner, and the ASC Foundation fundraiser! Thanks to all the volunteers who worked to make all the events a success.

Speaking of the Foundation, as the cataract study continues at the University of Pennsylvania, there is an interest in knowing what health research breeders and Cocker Spaniel fanciers in general are interested in pursuing. The Foundation plans to distribute a health survey this Fall to all members to help identify the issues which are more important so that your donations go to the research which is most important to you.

The American Spaniel Club Board had a productive meeting at Purina at the beginning of the National Specialty weekend at which several important issues were discussed. We received a positive report on the new regional Meet the Breeds program being offered by the AKC. ASC Zone Directors have more information on these events in their zones—and I'm sure they would welcome any volunteers!



Member Club Support committee chair, Genea Jones, and members of her committee are working to develop ideas and programs for our local clubs to help promote those clubs and their activities. The Member Club Support committee is the result of the club's long-term strategic planning. As part of that

planning, the ASC is also working on better communication with members, expanding the club's outreach to potential new members, and developing ideas for new activities for current and future club members. All ideas and volunteers are welcome!

One of the issues facing all Cocker Spaniel fanciers is the negativity experienced through social media. An example was the unauthorized use of a clip from the Show Dog Video Pros (SDVP) livestream which was used to criticize a handler and the American Spaniel Club. Posting any video provided by SDVP on social media is a violation of that company's Terms of Service. Under the Terms of Service, any individual who posts the copyrighted video to any social media platform is subject to legal action for copyright infringement. The American Spaniel Club supports SDVP's effort to take action to protect their intellectual property rights.

It is important for members to know that violations of the SDVP video policies and terms of service jeopardize future contracts with the video company, and the ability of ASC to provide livestreaming or video services of ASC conformation events.

The other issue is one that the ASC does not take lightly—the use of a very short video clip to portray an exhibitor as being abusive while showing at the Cocker Spaniel National Specialty. The excerpt in question showed Mrs. Linda Pitts correcting a dog which was distracted by a noise, and then lifting it and putting it back down into a stack. At no time was Mrs. Pitts abusive and the dog was not harmed in any way.

Let me make this clear: the American Spaniel Club does not condone abusive behavior toward any dog exhibited at the club's events. The AKC provides a means for disciplining anyone who exhibits abusive behavior while at a show site through a bench committee hearing. At no time during the ASC Cocker Spaniel National Specialty was a complaint filed with the show committee by any exhibitor, spectator, vendor, or other individual accusing anyone at the show of abusive behavior.

Because exhibitors and fanciers are concerned about negativity that is present on social media, earlier this year the ASC Board approved a proposed revision to the club's Code of Ethics. In accordance with the club's Bylaws, the comment period on that proposal has concluded, and it is time for members to vote on whether to approve the revised Code of Ethics. All members will be receiving a mailing from the ASC which will include a ballot and envelopes to return to the ASC Corresponding Secretary. The deadline for returning the ballots will be noted in the mailing.

To help cut down on mailing costs for the club, the ASC Board would like the consent of members to send ballots in the future electronically in accordance with the ASC ByLaws. A consent form will be sent to members in a mailing separate from the Code of Ethics ballots. A member's signature on the form will grant the club permission to send that member electronic balloting in the future. An important note: the club will only send electronic ballots to members who agree to receive them. Anyone who does not sign the consent form will continue to receive official ASC ballots through traditional mailings.

Looking ahead to the future—the 2023 Cocker Spaniel National Specialty and Agility Trial will be held at Purina Farms. Zone 5 is already working to round up as many of you as possible to attend or help at its planned Wild West show! So, polish the spurs, break out the Stetsons and denim and get ready to kick up your heels the weekend of July 20-23, 2023!

The Ruby Perpetual Memorial Award reflects a high level of performance and breed type as defined in the breed standard and tested in competition and trials. The Ruby Perpetual Memorial Award will be presented during the January ASC Annual Meeting in recognition of the honor and prestige it carries.

The American Spaniel Club, Inc. will offer a Versatility Award to members in good standing who have a flushing spaniel achieving at least three titles at AKC authorized events in the following categories:

Breed Conformation Hunting Test
Obedience Tracking
Rally Master Agility
Field Trial

Earning three titles out of the seven listed is necessary— one title must be a conformation Championship, one title must be in either Obedience, Rally, or Agility and one title must be in either Field, Hunting or Tracking. During the time the titles were earned, the flushing spaniel must have been owned by a member of the club. The award will be an engraved plaque. Only one plaque will be awarded if jointly owned.

To apply, members must submit a copy of the AKC registration papers, a copy of the AKC conformation Championship certificate, and a copy of two other AKC titles from the list to Versatility Award Chair, Jeanne Grim, by November 1. The award will be presented at the ASC Annual Meeting in January.

Performance Versatility Award

The American Spaniel Club, Inc. will offer a Performance Versatility Award to members in good standing who have a flushing spaniel achieving at least three titles at AKC authorized events in the following categories:

Obedience Hunting Test
Rally Master Tracking
Field Trial Agility

Earning three titles out of the six titles listed is necessary—one title must be in either Obedience or Rally Master, one title must be in Agility and one title must be in either Field, Hunting or Tracking. During the time when two of the three titles were earned, the flushing spaniel must have been owned by a member of the club. The award will be an engraved plaque. Only one plaque will be awarded if jointly owned.

To apply, members must submit a copy of the AKC registration papers, a copy of the three AKC titles from the list to Versatility Award Chair, Jeanne Grim, by November 1. The award will be presented at the ASC Annual Meeting in January.

The Bentley Memorial Award

The Bentley Memorial Award was established by the American Spaniel Club, Inc. and Carolee Douglas (Kapewood's Versatile Cocker Spaniels), to honor the achievements of CH LaMar's Bentley UD TD AXP AJP, the first sporting dog to win an all-breed BEST IN SHOW and multiple BESTS IN SPECIALTY SHOW while holding the titles of CDX, OA, and OAJ. The Bentley Award recognizes the versatility of the cocker spaniel that excels in conformation while holding performance titles.

Complete applications, including all of the documentation below, for the Bentley Memorial Award are due November 1st and should be sent to:

The Bentley Memorial Award will be a ceramic statue of a cocker spaniel along with a \$500 check. The Bentley Memorial Award will be presented at some time during the January ASC Flushing Spaniel Show in recognition of the honor and prestige it carries.

Requirements for the award:

The dog must be a conformation champion. The performance titles may be earned before the conformation championship. The required conformation award(s) are earned while holding the performance titles.

Acceptable Performance Titles

- Titles in 3 areas of performance at the novice level (CD; NA/NAJ (both); TD or TDU; JH)
- OR —
- Titles in 2 areas of performance if 1 title is from an advanced level (CDX; OA/OAJ (both); TDX or VST; SH or higher). The advanced title must be from a different area than the novice title.

Acceptable Conformation Awards

(must be earned after performance titles)

- 1 All Breed Best In Show or Reserve Best in Show
- 2 All Breed Group Placements (1-4)
- 3 Best in Specialty Show wins
- 1 Owner-Handled Best In Show or Reserve Best in Show

ELVIS– HOSPICE THERAPY DOG

Beginning of a New Adventure!

Therapy dogs visiting hospice patients provide a distraction from pain, anxiety and provide a break from their daily routine. This article features "Team Elvis," Sheryl Gadol and her sweet, calm, beautiful cocker spaniel, Elvis. Sheryl and Elvis recently completed their next-level therapy dog training to become a Hospice Therapy Dog team. They are doing in-home visits, and Sheryl is sharing the beginning of this compassionate and respected pet therapy

volunteer service to others. The therapy dog team has a positive effect on the patients, family members, and caregivers.



What kind of visits do vou and Elvis do?

Elvis and I do home visits. Each visit last about an hour. When a patient signs up for Home Hospice, pet therapy is one of the services they can request. I have a volunteer coordinator who contacts me when a patient or their family requests to see Elvis. I am told where the patient lives, their condition, and I can choose if I want to accept the visit. So far, we have not turned any visits down.

Sheryl shares with us...

Elvis and I took a therapy dog class in 2019. In February 2020, Elvis passed his therapy dog test and was certified to begin visits. While waiting for his official documents to come so we could start visiting, the world shut down from Covid.

What made you interested in hospice therapy visits?

In October 2021, I saw an ad for The Visiting Nurse Home & Hospice in my local paper, *The Providence Journal*. They were looking to start a hospice therapy dog program. I knew that was perfect for us. When my dad was on Home Hospice, I witnessed the connection he had with my dogs. This therapy dog hospice program was what I wanted to do with Elvis. Many people have problems relating and dealing with death, but dogs know they just need attention and love.

Is there any special training required of either of you other than certification with a therapy dog registry?

I completed a 30-hour course to earn Certified End-of Life Specialist (CEOFL) certification and designation. The course was designed for the student/handler to learn and transform their understanding of death, grief, and loss. I also completed an additional training program for all employees of the organization. The training dealt with patient privacy as well as state and Medicare requirements for direct patient care. I was required to complete health screening, be fully vaccinated, and pass a background check. The Visiting Nurse Services also provides continuing education and training as well as regular volunteer support meetings.

Tell us something about Team Elvis's new journey so far.

Elvis's first patient was an elderly lady that was in and out of consciousness. Elvis just sat at her feet. When she opened her eyes, she looked at him and smiled and then closed her eyes. He just knew to remain calm and wait. I don't know if that was the last time she smiled because we didn't visit her again. That is the nature of hospice. Our first few visits were one time only, and by the next week, they were gone. Imagine how powerful that is to bring some peace to someone right before they transition from life.

Elvis is now matched with a weekly patient, Miss E. She loves that they almost have the same name. We don't know how long she has, but we do know she looks forward to his visit every week. She requests that we go for a walk together. Her CNA pushes her in her wheelchair, while we walk beside her. She says that's what she misses most about no longer having a dog. I look forward to our walks with her now too.

What goals do you have for this new era of pet therapy?

As for goals... Our goal is to make a difference to the people we visit, to bring a smile to their faces, and to distract them from their pain by petting Elvis or just having him nearby. Maybe they can enjoy their day because we shared some special moments with them by reaching out and making them feel special. Elvis is happy when he makes others happy. That is why he is a great therapy dog.

I hope to add hospice facilities to our visits when the pandemic is over. I would love the opportunity to reach more people on our journey. For now, I feel safe with the home visits, so for the time being, we will continue with them.

Note: Thank you, Sheryl, for sharing information concerning Team Elvis and this very compassionate pet therapy volunteer service. The patients are very blessed

to have Elvis sit at their feet, calmly staying nearby or taking a walk with them. Elvis is definitely a wonderful, natural therapy dog, and you and Elvis are a very special therapy dog team!

Elvis is also very accomplished in conformation as well as performance. He is an example of the popular Cocker Spaniel saying—"Cockers Do It All!" Officially Elvis is known as: GCH MACH2 Gadol's King

of Hearts BN FDC MXC MJC MXF T2B3 CGCA CGCU TKN AHOD*, Active Certified Therapy Dog.

MORE SPORTING OPTIONS FOR YOU AND YOUR DOG.


No, I'm not proposing to vou. I'm talking about something that can be hard to get, but once you have it, it makes everything with regards to performance easier. It's called engagement, and it basically boils down to the dog wanting to be with you more than anything else. More than the spectators, more than the judge, more than the environment. When built up correctly, it can make a huge dif-

ference to your dog's performance in the ring. I suspect most of us, especially those of us that have watched a variety of performance competitions, have witnessed a run that seems magical because the dog and handler are essentially working as one. This is because there has been a significant amount of work put into engagement. You can watch a perfect performance that just seems to lack something—technically the

routine is flawless, but that spark isn't there. **Engagement is what puts the pizzazz into a routine or a run**.

Engagement is an ephemeral thing that is difficult to put into words. Oh, it can be described simply enough, but it is very difficult to understand. And until you've worked on it and spent time solidifying it, you may not even realize it's something you need. I have watched performances where the dog can't seem to get away from the handler fast enough. Or they

are like two separate individuals in the ring, instead of a single team. Those teams often lack engagement, among having other issues. Engagement won't fix everything, but it can help with a lot of issues.



thing called engagement and how do we get it? Many novice trainers and handlers believe that engagement is having their dog watching them at all times. And while that can be a part of engagement, it isn't the whole story. Engagement is developed over time and it most often requires effort to develop. Some dogs are naturally engaged with the handler, but they tend to be few and far between. Engagement isn't just

about the dog looking at you—it's about them wanting to be with you, even when you're stiff and nervous and weird. With my dogs, engagement starts at the same time as skills training starts. They are built in tandem, so that the dog naturally understands that both are required in order to play the game.

A simple form of engagement, that virtually every dog employs, is their pure joy at your arrival home after an absence. When I walk through the door, the dogs' eyes are bright, their tails are wagging and some of them have to run and find

a toy to show me. All of this is engagement—they have chosen to use energy to get off the couch or the dog bed to welcome you home. The challenge with engagement is taking it on the road. When I get home from work (or

from running errands or what have you), I am the most exciting thing to my dogs. If I'm outside working with one of the dogs, I might be moderately exciting, but they might see a cat streak by, or a kid with a snack, and just like that I could be the least interesting thing around. Some dogs stay engaged with their owner regardless of what's around them, but for many dogs, there is a hierarchy of rewards, and humans aren't always at the top. Cockers are fairly human-focused, but my Whippet will choose chasing a rabbit over doing a sit stay, every day of the week. Some of that has to do with what they were bred to do, since Sporting dogs have traditionally worked closely with humans over their development.

I do want to say that many of the elite trainers and competitors in any venue incorporate engagement work into their training. If you are fortunate enough to take classes from an instructor that understands the importance of engagement, stick with them! I first learned about engagement training and exercises from my competition obedience instructor, and they have literally changed how I train and work with every dog, regardless of what we're working on. I went from having a dog that left the ring as soon as the leash came off to having a strong connection with that dog, which has carried us

to the highest levels of rally and obedience competition. If you have the opportunity to work with one of the best, seize it with both hands. Many of the top competitors now offer online courses, online coaching and even just webinars that talk about engagement in the various stages of training and competing. It is seldom broken out as an individual topic but rather woven into the fabric of their training and trialing methodology. This means that even if you can't attend a class or seminar in person, you can still have access to some of the latest and greatest methods for incorporating engagement into your regular training routine.

Engagement isn't something that can be taught in a single article or even in several articles. There are so many variables, including your dog's temperament, your temperament and other things. How your dog reacts to any of the usual exercises will affect your next move, just like with any train-

ing. There are 5 basic stages of engagement, according to Denise Fenzi, and they are:

Stage 1 – Handler starts engagement

Stage 2 – Dog starts engagement

Stage 3 – Dog starts engagement and must sustain it

Stage 4 - Dog asks for engagement and work

Stage 5 – Sustained engagement and work at the handler's request

Some stages take longer to work through and some stages are quite short. Stage 5 is the ultimate goal, as that is what will help you be successful in a competition arena. A typical obedience round can run anywhere from 6 to 10 minutes long. It can take some time to build up your dog's level of engagement so that he can maintain it throughout that whole round. Of course there is opportunity for physical and verbal praise in between exercises, to some degree, but by then the dog must find the work and being with you more rewarding than the alternatives (leaving the ring, visiting the judge, taking a victory lap). With the dog being off leash for at least half of the round (at the Novice level), engagement is critical to maintaining that line of communication. The need for engagement just increases as the level of difficulty increases, so it's important to start off on the right foot and to maintain engagement as your training progresses. Engagement exercises will change over time, based on the relationship between you and your dog. Don't allow your engagement work to stagnate—you certainly wouldn't let your training do so.

I hope that I have demonstrated the value of engagement with your dog, regardless of the activities you do with your dog. Even having engagement with your conformation dog can improve their performance and help you both shine brighter in the ring. No article could adequately cover the wide range of engagement exercises and activities that can help your dog realize that you are more fun than anything else in the environment, including other animals, people, and even food. Okay, okay food is a tough one to get our Cockers to ignore, but it can be done! You can do a rally run that has the food bowl distractors on the figure eight exercise and not be worried that your dog is going to dive for those bowls. Whether you compete in rally obedience or not, I think you can understand the difficulty of asking any Cocker Spaniel to completely ignore food bowls. Engagement isn't a guarantee of success, but it's fantastic insurance and it really is low cost. You don't need expensive equipment—just attention to your dog and time spent together.

HOW TO PREVENT MOMMY-ITIS

ANYONE WHO HAS DEALT WITH OTHER PEOPLE'S DOGS IS VERY FAMILIAR WITH THESE TWO SCENARIOS:

Scenario #1

The Dane who is friendly, well-socialized, outgoing and has a stable temperament; he's a pleasure to be around. Perhaps his owner-handler has decided to see how he does with a professional on the end of the lead at the next show. No one expects any problems, because this dog is socialized, has a nice temperament and is ring-experienced. However, the trouble starts as soon as the handler takes the lead and attempts to leave the owner; the dog immediately becomes anxious. As the owner departs (or the handler, with dog in tow, attempts in vain to leave the owner) the dog strains and pulls at the end of the leash, trying to get back to his owner. He continually flips around, cries and whines, and can ONLY face in the direction the owner departed in. The dog is nearly impossible to show, as now he is frantic and stressed because he's been separated from the owner. He can't move in a straight line because he was too busy trying to locate where "mommy" went. Coming out of the ring, he charges back to the owner, who then pets him and makes a big deal about his return to her. The handler is frustrated because the dog behaved poorly and the owner is upset because her dog was bad and she just wasted a chunk of change on a professional handler for no reason.

Scenario #2

Next we have the companion dog. He's never seen a show ring, and probably never will. He's a much-loved companion and is ALWAYS with his owner. Everywhere. All the time. Never left alone for more than a very short while and certainly never crated. When the owner got his dog, he was certain that where ever he went, the dog would go. After all, dogs are a commitment and a part of the family. Owner and dog enjoy long walks and romps in the dog park. When the owner works in his home office, the dog sleeps under his desk. Now, suddenly there is a family emergency and the owner must leave and have the dog boarded. The dog is so anxious and stressed during boarding, the kennel owner is worried about the dog's health.

What do these dogs have in common? They are owned by people who love them and have worked at properly socializing their dog. Both dogs are very good

around people, dogs and situations—as long as they are with their owner. However, both owners have omitted an important part of socialization—how to teach the dog to be adaptable in different situations and with different people without their owner present. This lack of, as I call it, "adaptability training" is either omitted because the owner never thought of it, or is simply because the owner is too over-protective. And now they have a dog that becomes anxious when separated from them—mommy-itis as we call it!

Teaching a dog to be comfortable and confident in situations without its owner is just as important as socialization and should be included as part of puppy training. In fact, it should be considered mandatory training for the dogs' health; as we all know, a stressed Dane can be prone to bloat. An anxious Dane may injure himself trying to escape from a caregiver. Much of the stress and anxiety that comes from being parted from their owner can be prevented with some simply additions to puppy training and socialization.

First, while structure is a very good thing in puppy training, the owner needs to "mix it up" a bit after the puppy becomes acclimated into the new home and good progress is being made with housebreaking. If everything is always the same in the puppy's routine, then as the dog grows older, that's how it should be in his mind and he will be much less accepting to anything different. These simple steps can be done from the point the puppy comes home to about four months of age. Remember, these are things to do in addition to regular socialization and during each exercise make sure there is positive reinforcement both in the form of verbal praise and treats.

- Move the crate into different locations in the house; including areas that might not be occupied as much as other places. (Always make the crate a pleasant experience, having special toys or treats the puppy can have only when in the crate).
- If you have access to different types of crates (such as Vari-Kennels and wire crates) change them back and forth.
- Have different activities happen around the crate; sometimes noisy stuff happening, others times quiet.
- Gently (very gently) move the crate while the puppy is in it.

HOW TO PREVENT MOMMY-ITIS

- When guests come to the house, have them put a leash on the puppy and take him out of the crate without the owner being present. At this point, all they have to do is take the puppy out, then put him back.
- As the puppy becomes more confident of having a stranger attach his leash and take him out of the crate, step it up; have the person walk the puppy around the house, then in the yard, then perhaps a short walk around the neighborhood.

When the puppy is about four months old add these few steps:

- At Puppy Kindergarten or handling class, have a stranger take the lead and move a few feet away from the owner. The owner must NOT fuss over the puppy or make a big deal of him leaving. If anything a simple, quiet "Go" command is enough. At this point, the stranger only goes a few feet away, stays away a few seconds, and returns to the owner. Upon return, the owner must (again!) NOT make a big deal. If the puppy jumps up or acts anxious, the owner must simply ignore the puppy until he settles. This exercise is repeated numerous times at each class, gradually getting further away from the owner and for longer times. Eventually, the owner will be out of sight during this. Soon, the puppy learns the new person is not going to take him away from his person but will give him treats and praise.
- Have the puppy do sleepover. This is a very important part of adaptability training and should be done at different places. It might be at a boarding facility that you trust, a friend's house, or with the breeder. You only have to drop the dog off in the evening, have him stay overnight, and get him in the morning. Again, you need to "mix it up" so he will feel comfortable no matter where he is. As time goes on, have him do one or two sleepovers every four-to-six weeks. In the long run, this will really pay off. Even if you think you will never have to leave your dog, this is important. Things happen and you never know when your dog might need to be cared for by a stranger.

At about five-to-six months, if the puppy is destined for the show ring, you might discuss with your handler about sending the puppy to "puppy camp" prior to entering a "real" show. Many handlers offer this, and it simply allows the puppy to become familiar with the handler, their facilities, assistants, vehicles and all the other things that go into being a show dog. The handler may also be able to work with stacking and gaiting the dog. If the puppy is going to be a companion, sending him off to visit a trusted dog friend for a few days will accomplish the same thing.

For the show puppy, by the time he's ready for the ring, he will have learned he can go with introduced strangers, be comfortable sleeping and eating in new surroundings, and his first show experience will be much more positive for both him and the handler. For the companion puppy, the owner knows the puppy can handle being with other people and not freak out. People who have to handle that puppy—veterinarians and their staff, groomers and such—will appreciate this.

Two of the biggest reasons adaptability training doesn't happen are over-protective owners and reinforcement of negative behavior. The puppy owner feels the baby needs to be protected and coddled and certainly wouldn't survive without his human mommy to take care of him. This reluctance prevents the owner from "letting go" and starting this training when very young. And, as with any dog training, we all know the earlier you start, the easier it will be down the road! The owner sets all sorts of restrictions on the puppy "Oh he's too young to do this or that" when actually, he isn't. When the puppy is given the chance to go with someone else and is perhaps a bit anxious, the owner reinforces that by using a coddling "it's ok" tone of voice—basically telling the puppy it's ok to be anxious.

In closing, a few extra steps in the puppy socialization process will help your Dane (or, in our case, cocker) become a well-socialized and adaptable dog that will be able to handle anything that life might bring.

UPDATES AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

MID-YEAR 2022 CATARACT RESEARCH UPDATE FROM DR. AGUIRRE AND TEAM

Cataracts in the Cocker Spaniel are a very complex disease, not only in terms of inheritance but also in how the clinical appearance relates to a specific genetic trait/locus. The genomic area identified so far by WGAS in our cataract study is extensive and the sequence information obtained especially from WGS is so large that it requires

specialized training in bioinformatics, sequence analysis, and computational biology, along with large central computer facilities to effectively analyze the sequence.

This limiting factor has been overcome by a generous grant creating the Sylvia M. Van Sloun Laboratory for Canine Genomic Analysis at the University of Pennsylvania which is comprised of supercomputer clusters to specifically analyze genomic data for many universi-

ty studies, including ours. Equally important is the addition of a new Post Doctoral fellow to the existing team, Dr. Anil Sigdel, whose expertise in quantitative genomics in cattle genetics will provide more expertise to review data and develop new mathematical models in search of the cataract locus in our breed.

Due to the outcome of the recent research, we have confirmed there are indeed identified genetic differences between early-stage and late-stage cataracts. The present approach is to separate the 2 age groups once again, to facilitate the study. Twenty dogs will be initially analyzed by WGAS and Low pass WGS. The combination of these two techniques exponentially increases the information obtained. The use of supercomputers and

new mathematical models are expected to identify the differences between the control and affected and lead to a final marker. Along with the data from these 20 dogs, the data obtained previously will also be included in the analysis. Once these results are obtained the focus will shift to the late onset group.

Further good news is that the Van Sloun grant allows the costs of the scientific team to be covered and the Foundation going forward is only

responsible for research supplies and not personnel salaries. Dr. Aguirre and his team are committed to the outcome of this research and to obtaining a test. They can not stress enough the continued participation with new DNA samples and updated eye exams. This is the MOST important requirement for the successful outcome of this study.  OX40 Checkpoint Molecule Targeted Antibodies for Cancer Immunotherapy in Dogs.
 The Principal Investigator is Dr. Steven Dow Colorado, State University. • Genetics of Primary Angle Closure Glaucoma in American Cocker Spaniels.

The Principal Investigator is Dr. Sara Thomasy, DVM, Ph.D. at The University of California, Davis. We will have Dr. Thomasy present a webinar for us later this year so stay tuned for that.

• Plasminogen-activator Inhibitor-1 (PAI-1) and Impaired Fibrinolysis in Immune-Mediated Hemolytic Anemia.

Principal investigators are Dr. Tracy Stokol at Cornell University and Dr. Steven Friedenberg, University of Minnesota.

As the Foundation expands the support of research programs in other disease areas in the future, we want to make you all aware that participation in these studies by breeders and members of the Cocker Spaniel fancy will be critical for them to be successful. All studies need a LARGE number of DNA blood samples to run analytics on and in the future success will depend on your support in this area almost more than the monetary support. So please expect our pleading in this area to continue and thank you in advance for that support.

ANNOUNCING TWO NEW ASC FOUNDATION HEALTH AND RESEARCH INITIATIVES

One of the outcomes of our Foundation strategic planning was to study and commit to and/or create specific research objectives and create annual program budgets to support them over the rather lengthy amount of time most research requires. We have been fortunate to have

the opportunity to directly fund through many contributions the Cataract Research Study with the University of PA with Dr. Aguirre. Most of the research we fund is through the AKC CHF and will benefit Cockers but very few are Cocker specific.



The question for the Foundation Board was what research should be a target along with our current commitments? We have taken two approaches to answer this.

FIRST, it has been almost a decade since the Foundation has conducted a health survey within our fancy on what are the disease and health concerns of breeders and owners. The results of such a survey would be vital in directing where the Foundation should focus our search for creating and funding new research programs or supporting existing ones. Our Health and Research chair, Fulvia Bartoli, along with her committee

is working hard to get a confidential and secure **health survey** out as soon as possible. We ask for everyone's participation when that occurs. If you have any input or specific concerns on what we should be surveying please contact Fulvia.

SECOND, we reached out to the Foundations of the other spaniel breeds and through the leadership of Health and Research Chair, Fulvia Bartoli, we are excited that we have formed a discussion group called the **Spaniel Health Initiative** with the intent to share health and research focus, programs, and funding across the clubs and their foundations. We hope to find commonality among the spaniel breeds where we can leverage and fund research together as a group. Included in this group, at the moment, are the English Cocker Spaniel, English Springer Spaniel, Welch Springer Spaniel, and Clumber Spaniel national breed club foundations. This exciting new Spaniel Health Initiative has met now three times and the main takeaways and strategies are the need to update our own Health Survey, identify the common causes affecting the Spaniel breeds, and share participation in clinical trials in the future.

THIS ISSUE'S SPOTLIGHT:





I am Lindy Bennett and I have been president of the South Atlantic Cocker Spaniel Club in Jacksonville, Florida off and on for 30 years. This club has benefited from committed members and leaders, and this year, the club will be putting on our 68th and 69th specialty shows in Deland, FL on September 23rd and 24th! There were ten years since our first show in January of 1948 that we did not hold specialty shows, but they have been held annually since 1985. That was the first show I participated in with my first black and tan (thank you Laura Henson), and we won big, if I remember correctly. Because we are a navy community, during war time in Korea and Vietnam, it was hard for our club to mobilize at home, but we have been going strong, with annual shows the last 38 years. I am proud that I have been at the helm many of those years.

In past years, we have looked to the leadership of Steve and Maryrose Picciuolo, Burt and Betty Homan, Lamar and Elaine Mathis, MaryLu and Herman Eppler, Doris Fink, Russ and Louise Milner, Sandy and Ken St. John, and Lois Hicks Beach, plus loyal members that have been around for a LONG time, and the club has thrived. Most of the older people in cockers will remember all these names. Our 25-year membership averages about 15, but they are good, hard workers and have made us successful time and again. More recently, some younger members have stepped up to the plate and offered new ideas and fresh leadership so our future looks bright enough to try back to back specialty shows this year. Thank you to Dana Spurrier, Sherie Luebker, Debbie Kaufman, Karin Klerholm, Lee and Ileana Tosco, Nancy Virden, Diane Hughes, Kathy Chapman, Kristina Broome and Judie Posner for the boots on the ground the past decade. It does not take a lot of people to make a successful club. Over the decades many records have been lost as well as many memories, so I apologize to those I have forgotten. Eighty-plus years for the South Atlantic Cocker Spaniel Club make for lots of memories!

In the past, our show has sponsored grooming competitions and demonstrations, puppy matches, puppy evaluations/practice and other conformation-centric events. This next decade we are going to cater to our members that would like to try performance events, with the goal of adding some to our shows in the future. We have always supported Junior Handlers (my own kids flunked that one), and they get generous rewards at our shows. We always offer sweeps for Veterans and Cut Downs. We also are thrilled to participate in two bi-annual eye exams each year with the local Sheltie rescue. This makes it easy to stay up to date on exams for all our club members and their cockers - our gratitude to Dr. Brown, who has volunteered for this effort for the last 15 years. The club switched to Zoom meetings during the pandemic, and will likely continue them for the foreseeable future. Thank you, Dana, for doing the work on setting that up. We try to have local members attend meetings at my house after the eye clinics, where we can enjoy wine, lunch and chitchat. Zoom meetings have allowed our distant members in the state, here in Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas, to participate more easily. This is a big plus for the membership, and I recommend all clubs incorporate that feature to expand participation.

Because of the success of our shows and the generosity of our members (and Maryrose's tight control over the purse), the SACSC has been able to keep very acceptable bank balances and a healthy checking and savings account. We try to collect enough in trophy donations to offer really nice trophies; our entry fees are reasonable; and we do not have large expenditures to secure a wonderful show venue (thank you West Volusia Kennel Club). Our entries average 70+ dogs, and we have majors in all sexes and varieties as a rule. We make a concerted effort to hire local people for sweepstakes and judges, when possible, to keep expenses in those categories down. Several years ago, we stopped being our own superintendent and aligned ourselves with MB-F, which has been a real benefit to our Show Secretary, Dana. MB-F makes it much easier to host a show, and we have had very few complaints. I encourage less successful shows to not scrimp on this expense. As I have seen many clubs do recently, we will be trying gift cards and gas cards as trophies in the future, to make it easier for us to attract exhibitors from father away. In this day and age, we think that is a good way to go and they are not bulky to take to the show or display. The last few years we have offered embroidered towels, but they do take up a lot of room. This will be the last year for those, as we have lost the towel expert, Karin, to Sweden.

For clubs that are struggling, I offer this advice:

- Reach out to members from other areas and states. Zoom calls allow them to participate in our club.
- Use a licensed superintendent and partner with an all-breed club to share expenses. West Volusia Kennel Club shares their panel with us, so we can use one of their judges. This really saves on expenses.
- Switch to more valuable and less cumbersome trophies that are more immediately useful. Most handlers do not care what they get as
 trophies and many never see their client's mantle either.
- Use a lot of on-line resources to advertise your show and to collect for trophies. We are trying just a general trophy fund this year without
 specific class/breed donations to try to simplify the collection of trophy pledges. The easier you make the job, the easier it is to get
 someone to volunteer for it.
- · Get a PayPal account set up, making sure it is not a business one, so people can use friends and family to donate.
- Look back to owners that have won at your show in the past to solicit additional trophy pledges from them....it they won in the past they are more likely to donate in the present.
- · Encourage handlers to attend your shows, offering as many sets of points as possible for them.
- Make sure the facility is set up to be convenient to handlers and exhibitors.
- Have a point person at the show to help newcomers navigate the grooming spaces, parking situation and ring side scheduling. Having someone to help will make them more anxious to return next year.
- We also always serve some sort of food, including snacks and desserts as a service to our exhibitors, because our shows almost always overlap some mealtime. If you offer the same food service to all-breed participants make it clear that they have to pay for it. This takes careful monitoring by the hospitality chair and a donation jar.
- Make sure your specialty show setup is nice and stands out from the all-breed generic ring set up. Try to be near an outside door, where
 grass is available for exhibitor's dogs. Cultivate a good working relationship with the all-breed show chair.
- Finally! Take photos of everything!

Remember! Our next event is September 23 and 24, 2022, back-to-back specialty shows, in conjunction with the West Volusia three day all-breed shows. Our specialty shows will be on Friday and Saturday in the afternoon, so Sunday will still be an early day for people to head for home. They will not run as late as it did last year, due to improved scheduling by MB-F and the WVKC. If you have any questions, you can contact Dana Spurrier, dana.spurrier@comcast.net. We have easy parking, easy unloading/loading, AC rings and AC grooming with reservations via WVKC. Please plan to join us and take home one or more of those majors. We look forward to many more years of your support!




